

Boys of Omaha Are Ready for Their Big Week

Letter Received From President Coolidge—Parade to Have 15,000 Marchers.

Honorary chairmanship of National Boys' week has been accepted by President Coolidge. In a letter to Walter W. Head of Omaha, chairman, the president expresses his pleasure in being able to co-operate in making Boys' week a success. His letter follows:

"It was a pleasure to receive William Head's letter, and the delight of representing boys who carry their invitation to accept the honorary chairmanship of boys' week, and assure them of my acquaintance in their efforts to bring about the development of a better citizenship may meet all your expectations."

Boys' week will be observed from April 27 to May 3. One day during the week, boys will rule the city. Another day 15,000 of them will parade. Mr. Head, who was unable to be in Washington at the time of the audience with President Coolidge, but who is active in the movement, said that this year 1,500 cities are expected to celebrate the week, in comparison with 468 cities last year.

More Next Year. "In 1925 we expect to have every city of any size join the movement," said Mr. Head.

"Business men enter heartily into the plan," said Louis Miller, Omaha executive chairman, last night. "It brings back to them memories of the old swimming hole and the old bicycle days."

John L. Kennedy, honorary chairman for Omaha, will be the first speaker of the celebration. His address will be given next Friday night at Temple Israel.

Temple Israel will open Boys' week activities two days before the week officially opens, with Mr. Kennedy's address the feature on the opening night. Sunday all churches in the city, Jewish, Catholic and Protestant, will put emphasis on boys' activities, both at the regular services and special meetings.

Each Day Filled. Monday, April 28, the boys will get special attention in the schools. Tuesday will be a big day, for then the boys will replace the city commissioners and other city and county officials, and take charge of industry for a short while. Elections have been held in city schools for the positions in music and entertainment.

Thursday boys in Omaha from the fourth grade to the age of 21 years, will fall into line for the loyalty parade. Fifteen thousand are expected to be in line. Friday will be boys' day at home, with special radio programs. Saturday, the final day, will be boys' day out-of-doors, with a program of sports.

Special moving pictures advertising the day began today at the World, Strand, Rialto and Sun theaters.

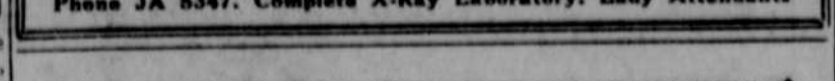
He was also fined \$100 and ordered to pay the cost of litigation. During appeal in the supreme court Kotas is in the county jail. Kotas operated a grain business.
