Winter Accumulations of Rubbish to Be Hauled Away by City.

The annual "cleanup and paint-up" campaign will open in Omaha tomorrow under direction of business houses, city officials, women's and civic organizations.

The beginning of the week is to be devoted to cleaning inside the houses, eliminating accumulations of waste paper and rubbish. City trucks and 20 government trucks are to be used in hauling away the dirt. In some sections of the city prizes have been offered for the best yards. Grass is to be planted, trees trimmed and flower beds made.

LONG AND SHORT TRAFFIC "COPS"

The smallest and largest policemen who ever directed traffic on Omaha streets will be seen Monday noon in full uniform.

They are members of the Irving Midgets troupe now appearing at the Wagon Theater.

At Sixteenth and Farnam streets, starting at 12, a midget exactly three feet tall will stop and start the lines of traffic, relieving the regular officer there for 10 minutes.

At Fifteenth and Douglas streets, at 12:15 a giant, seven feet, eight inches high, will stop and start the traffic with authority, probably picking up offending drivers and towing them aside if they don't obey his signals.

War Vet Arrives Here on Stretcher; No One Is at Station to Greet Him

Traveling 75 miles on a stretcher in a baggage car, H. A. "Pat" Zimmerman, 31, of Tecumseh, Neb., arrived in Omaha Thursday night and found no one to meet him.

He was taken to the baggage room of the railroad station, where Max Congrove, driver for the King Joy Taxi company, found him. Pat was unable to move himself, so with the aid of baggage men, the driver placed him on the back seat of his taxi and drove him carefully to the American Legion membership campaign headquarters, Sixteenth and Farnam streets, arriving there at 4:30 p. m.

The sick man explained as best he could that he was sent to Omaha to be cared for by the Disabled War Veterans' bureau. Dr. J. M. Curtis of Tecumseh had put him on the train. His told officials at the legion office that he was suffering from poisoning as the result of an attack of flu in France in 1918, where he was stationed at Le Mans in the postal service.

Ever since his return to this country in September, 1918, he said, he has had an infection in his head that had now spread to other parts of his body, making him helpless.

He underwent several operations in Council Bluffs and had returned to Tecumseh, where he owned a grocery store, only to have the poisoned condition return. The war veteran claims to be at the end of his resources after heavy expense for medical treatment. He has borrowed money from his father, Joseph Zimmerman, of Farnam, Ia., a grocer, and also from the banks to the extent of \$2,500, he says. He cannot ask for more money, he said. His sickness has cost him more than \$1,000.

By orders of the Disabled War Veterans' bureau, Pat was taken to Wise Memorial hospital.

"If I can only get well I can get free of debt," he said Saturday as he lay flat on his back in the hospital. "The pains in my legs, shoulders and head are terrible at night, but I know
