

# Buffaloes Lose Deciding Game of Series to Wichita by a Score of 5 to 3

## Musser Bests Bill Bailey in Pitchers' Battle

### Omaha's Ninth Inning Rally Falls Short—Robinson Leads at Bat With Two-Bagger, Homer.

WICHITA, April 21.—Omaha started its rally too late in the game today and dropped the third and deciding game of the series to Wichita, 5 to 3, in a pitchers' battle between Musser and Bailey.

Wichita's veteran right-hander had the best of the Omaha southpaw for the first eight innings. Omaha started its first and only real bid in the ninth, and made the local fans decidedly uneasy with three runs scored and two runners on base with the tying run, but big Stanton failed as a pinch hitter and fanned for the third out.

Wichita got a two-run lead in the first frame on one lone hit and held the lead all the way, increasing it to four runs in the fourth and two five in the eighth.

Wichita started with a walk and a long double in the first, which combined with an over throw in by Thompson, accounted for two runs. A single by Beck, O'Brien's double, a wild pitch by Bailey and a sacrifice fly made it two more in the fourth, and four singles in a row added one more in the eighth.

Musser held Omaha scoreless for eight innings, and only once, in the third, when Wilcox was thrown out at the plate, trying to score from second on Bailey's single, did Omaha have a man to third.

### Questioning of Amateur Status Given as Reason by Noted Tennis Star—Makes Letter Public.

Philadelphia, April 21.—William T. Tilden II, national tennis champion, today announced his resignation as a member of the American Davis cup and Olympic teams.

Tilden said that as his amateur status had been questioned he wished to relieve the Davis cup committee, which had named him for both teams, of any embarrassment that might arise over his position as an amateur player.

The letter is as follows: "From the report of the amateur rule committee of March 15, 1924, made public on Saturday last, a copy of which was mailed to me, I learn with astonishment that the player-writer in general, and I in particular, am regarded by the committee as not only no longer an amateur, but as an 'evil influence' in the game."
