Kansas Defeats Dundee.

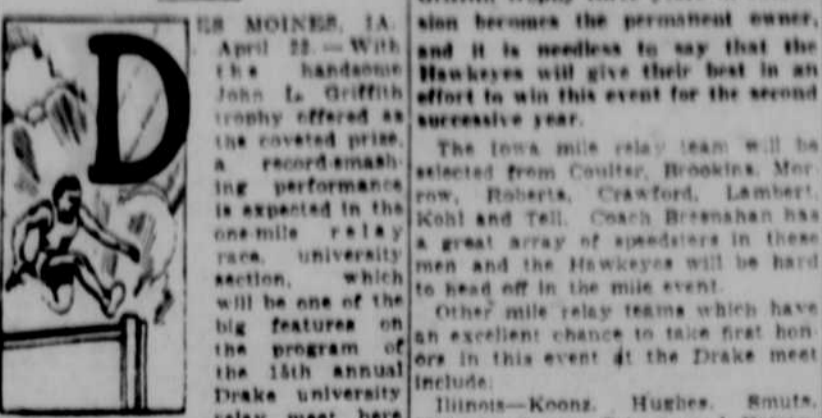
