

Tilden Refuses Invitation of Davis Cup Committee to Discuss His Resignation

Will Not Cancel Exhibition Net Games to Appear

Champion Says He Was Not Familiar With Ruling or He Would Not Have Offered Services.

Philadelphia, April 23.—William T. Tilden, national tennis champion, Tuesday declined the invitation of Julian S. Myrick, chairman of the American Davis cup committee to discuss his recent resignation from the Davis cup and Olympic teams at a conference in New York on Friday.

Mr. Tilden stated that he had a previous engagement to play in exhibition games in the south.

Calling attention to the dispute over his status as an amateur because of his activity in writing articles on tennis, Mr. Tilden stated that he would not have offered his services for this year to the executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis association had he been aware of the technical wording of the rule of the amateurs adopted March 15, 1924, by the amateur rule committee of that body.

In a letter to Mr. Myrick, Mr. Tilden said: "Let me point out that the amateur rule report of Mr. Holcombe Ward (chairman of the amateur rule committee) was made public and I should judge, partially rewritten after the executive committee meeting I attended where I offered my services for this year.

"Had I had knowledge of the official wording of the report on March 15, 1924, of the amateur rule committee, wherein players-writers are held up as a harmful influence to and an evil in the game, I could not at that time have agreed to play in Davis cup competition.

"Mr. Ward in his report specifically states that I, as a player-writer, at the present moment, violating the spirit and letter of the amateur rule, technically cannot be declared a professional under that rule until January 1, 1925, providing existing conditions continue.

"Self respect and a desire to maintain the highest standards of international amateur sport, leave me no other course of action than to refuse to play until my amateur status is definitely fixed and clearly recognized by the governing body in tennis.

"Once my amateur status is established beyond question, it will give me great pleasure to defend the Davis cup for my country if I am again asked to do so."

It's doing no injustice, being the truth, to say Mays has a bad temper, and was inclined to aurliness. He and Manager Huggins had rackets. So did Mays and Babe Ruth. The morale of the club was threatened.

Soms players thought then they were bigger in the eyes of the Yank owners than the manager. It's an old story. Col. T. L. Huston wasn't so strong for Huggins. But Col. Jacob Ruper, now sole owner, most certainly was.

In 1922 Mays hit the chute, losing 14 and winning only 12 games. He crashed altogether last season, figuring in few games and getting patted so sadly he was kept on the bench.
