

Ceremonies at Ft. Crook May 10

Elaborate Military Display for Dedication of Offutt Field.

The dedication of the Jarvis Offutt flying field at Fort Crook is to take place on Saturday afternoon, May 10, beginning at 10 a. m. Secretary of War Weeks announced recently that this flying field, belonging to the United States army, is to be named after Jarvis Offutt, Omaha boy, who was killed while flying over Vaucluseaux in 1915.

Dedication services will be in charge of the Douglas County Reserve Officers' association. Under direction of Maj. Gen. George B. Dunson, Maj. Lawrence Churchill, head of the air service in the Seventh corps area, will have the sixteenth observation squadron of Fort Riley, consisting of six planes, and six planes flown by reserve officers from Kansas City on hand. The Fort Riley squadron will be headed by Maj. Clarence H. Tinker, and the Kansas City contingent will be in charge of Lieutenant Carroll.

A dirigible from Scotts field, Illinois, will also be a feature in the service, and the Seventeenth infantry regiment, stationed at Fort Omaha and Crook, has been asked to appear in regimental parade.

The public is invited to witness the ceremony.

NEW HIGHWAY IS MAPPED OUT

Newcastle, Neb., April 23.—The proposed state highway project, known in northeast Nebraska as the "River Route," has been mapped out and recently the plans have been approved by the state engineer. The highway will extend from South Sioux City to Niobrara, passing through Jackson, Ponca, Newcastle, Maskell, Ober, Wynot, Fordyce and Crofton. Work on the project will begin this summer.

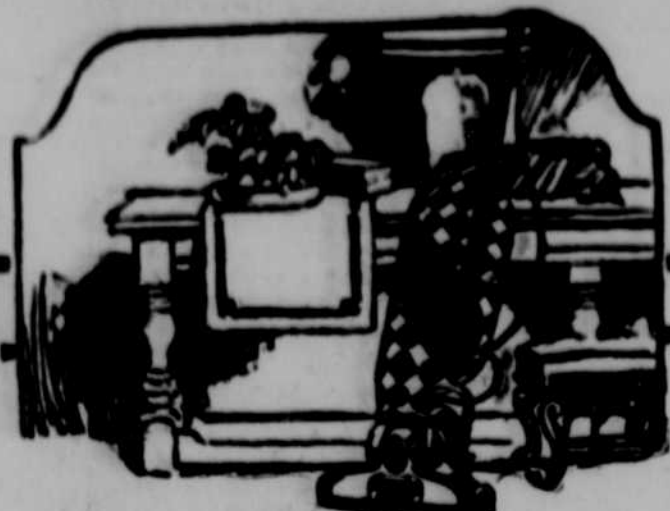
