Coolidge and Advisers Get Boone County Backing

Atton, Neb., April 26.—Resolutions adopted by Boone county republicans declare: "Notwithstanding the eternalities of partisan blackmail, gossip and hearsay evidence, which has recently been promulgated by our opponents on the eve of a national campaign purely for political effect, we view with admiration, respect and confidence our great leader, President Coolidge, and his able assistants, Hughes, Mellon, Hoover and others, whom the deluge of partisan mud has failed to tarnish. Nebraskan Plans to Help Capper Delay Adjournment Till Repeal Bill Is Taken Up.

Washington Correspondent The Omaha Bee—Washington, April 26.—The anti-Esch-Cummins factor in the senate is determined to do everything possible to hold the present session until action is taken on the bill calling for repeal of the so-called guarantee clause in the Esch-Cummins law.

Copper Addresses Committee.

Senator Capper went into detail on this subject today in an address before the interstate commerce committee. He said, in part: "It is common knowledge that many railroads are notorious financial failures. Some of this class of roads were built as purely speculative enterprises. Others were built with the view of promoters to avail themselves of public grants or public funds or for the quick and temporary boom exploitation of a region. Yet others were built as outlets for mining districts, once bonanza producers, but whose diggings, today, are exhausted. Some others were built to serve transportation needs of timber areas long since denuded of saw timber."
