

### Chuichi Taso Returns From Trip to Ocean

#### Omaha Merchant Says Island Empire Is Recovering Rapidly From Earthquake.

Only temporary buildings are being put up in Yokohama because of fear of another earthquake, according to Chuichi Taso of the Nippon Importing company, 218 South Eighteenth street, who returned this week from a month's stay in Japan. He makes a trip to Japan every year.

"Buildings of light wood with roofs of zinc are being erected," he said. "No two-story buildings or buildings of brick were erected since the earthquake. For this reason they were prepared for the second quake in January. The second quake was of the same force, but little damage was done.

"Laborers are still clearing away debris. I saw them carry away six dead Chinamen from a wrecked building that it had taken four months to clear away. In the Chinatown of Yokohama, 4,000 Chinamen out of 5,000 were killed.

"Laborers get more in Japan than the clerks and business men now.

"All the Japanese are grateful to America for its help in time of disaster. Even the little children know their clothes came from America."

Mr. Taso has little to say about the earthquake bill now before congress. He was not in Japan at the time of its discussion. There is such trouble in endeavoring to get passports for America that many do not attempt it, he said. He was on the ocean at the time of the marriage of Prince Hiroto that was celebrated throughout Japan. The prince is as popular there as the prince of Wales in England and is more democratic than any Japanese ruler has ever been, he said.

When can a trout swim across the Rocky mountains? The answer is: Two Ocean Pass, on the crest of the continental divide in the Jackson Hole district of Yellowstone National park.

Two Ocean lake, at an altitude of 9,600 feet, is famous for its fishing. From it flows the Atlantic creek eastward and the Pacific creek westward to the Gulf of California.

This year, for the first time, it is accessible to the public by means of the Two-Ocean-Pass horseback trip operating between Lewis Lake and Brooks Lake Inn, 100 miles south of the Yellowstone.

These trains have 15 horses and accommodate 100 guests each. Permanent camps have been established at short day's ride apart.
