

Flynn Praises "Square Six"

Declares Business Efficiency Chief Consideration in Picking Council.

Chameleon Cloak, Taking on Hues of Surroundings, Appears at Races

Women at Paris Track Wearing Dozens of Glass Bracelets of All Tints—"Shutter Gown," Whose Layers Can Be Opened or Closed at Will, Among Sensations.

The new coat is fashioned from a species of waterproof moiré silk treated with a mercury preparation which gives it a sheen of such brilliance that it reflects its surroundings. Thus the wearer, strolling across the Longchamps lawns, seemed garbed in green, while those on the gravel walks took on a neutral color, like sand, the intensity of the color varying with sunshine or clouds.

The same materials are being used for evening gowns, which, under the limelights in the popular cabarets, resemble the myriad tints of phosphorescent fish.

The thought of this year's styles, which is "as many colors as possible," results in "women wearing dozens of spun glass bracelets of every conceivable tint, a score or more often reaching to the elbow. Peacock feathers are again fashionable for evening headgear.

"Shutter Gown" Appears. The attempt to bring back mannish rimmer hats of tightly drawn and colored goatskins, which seemed successful earlier in the season has failed, stylish women insisting on tiny brimless toques fitting close

down to the ears and often fashioned of hundreds of hair feathers glued in single fashion on a suede base. Brightly hued parasols which, by means of a patented device, can be carried at any angle on an upright handle, are again fashionable, while the "shutter gown" with layers of silk resembling the old-fashioned window shutters, which can be opened or closed, according to the whim of the wearer and the heat of the day, was among the afternoon's sensations.

Meanwhile, Parisian women are bitterly complaining of the alleged style dictation by American women, especially as regards shoes. "French Women Complain." Posing to the fact that the fashionable shoemakers are making huge efforts to cater to the smart American women, their French customers complain that they have conspired to make the low heel stylish.

The "French" high heel shoes and the "master shoe" have almost completely disappeared from the best shoe shops, say the enraged French women, who assert that low heels are not only hideous but unhygienic.

"Low heels are largely responsible for the slouchy carriage of the average American girl," comments Pierre Trevelier, famous fashion writer. "The French women's slender erectness is doomed if the trans-Atlantic fashion is allowed to prevail."

RAID VICTIM TO BE BURIED IN BEATRICE

Beatrice, Neb., April 27.—Charles West of Bridgeport, Neb., who was shot and killed at Lavoie, Wyo., when officers raided a gambling room, formerly resided in Beatrice and Wyoming, Neb., where he worked as a tailor. He was a son-in-law of Harry Dibble of Beatrice, who has gone to Bridgeport to bring the body here for burial.

According to a dispatch from Casper, Wyo., West, who was one of the men sought by the officers, received a fatal wound when a revolver leveled on him by Deputy Vance was accidentally discharged.

He had \$240 in his pocket when killed. West was 35. He leaves a wife and one son. The funeral will be held here Monday.

Clemency Granted Eight Prisoners at Leavenworth

Leavenworth, Kan., April 26.—Clemency has been granted eight of the 12 military prisoners originally sentenced to hang or serve life terms for the murder in 1918 of Shelby Hiele, prisoner and alleged "stool pigeon" at the army disciplinary barracks at Fort Leavenworth, on recommendation of the special war department board which recently investigated cases of army prisoners.

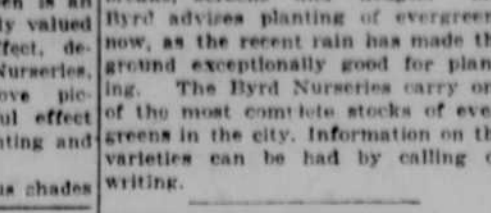

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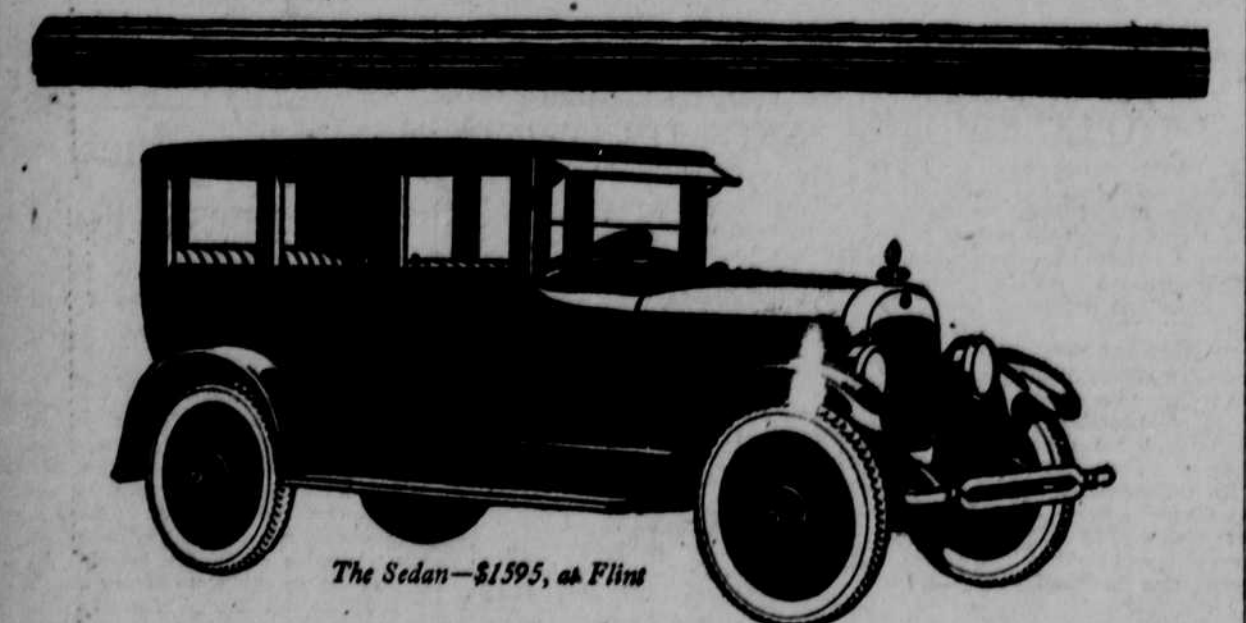
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
