

Jack Dempsey to Defend Heavyweight Title in Bout With Harry Wills

Tex Rickard to Stage Match in Jersey City

Promoter Also Abandons Further Negotiations With Luis Firpo—Believes Argentine Through.

NEW YORK, May 1.—Tex Rickard announced today he had matched Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills for a world's heavyweight championship fight at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City, on September 6.

So far as Wills is concerned the match is contingent upon a victory over either Quintin Romero, Chilean heavyweight, or Erminio Spalla, Italian holder of the European heavyweight title, some time in June at the Jersey bowl, Rickard said.

Wills already has signed for both contests and the promoter said he had obtained the agreement of Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, to the title match with the negro.

Rickard also announced that he had definitely abandoned all further negotiations with Luis Angel Firpo, following the latter's rejection of the promoter's latest bid for his services and insistence that he will return from the ring. Rickard has instructed his Buenos Aires agent, Juan Homs, to return to this country.

Rickard said he now was convinced that Firpo was firm in a desire to quit the ring and his latest report from Homs is that the Argentine heavyweight, putting aside all pugilistic affairs, has departed on a tour of his country's interior on his automobile business.

Watkins Wins Pentathlon

Lincoln, May 1.—Rex Watkins of Callaway, an athlete "who stands up to his marks" as described by Coach Schulte, won the annual Nebraska home course pentathlon by accumulating 4,442 points under the scoring system devised by the Husker track coach. Scottbluff set a new team record with 15,765 points.

Four performance records were lowered and Watkins broke one of these. He cleared the 120-high hurdles in 16 2/5 seconds. Fleming of Lincoln High set a new mark in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 10 inches; Wyatt broad jumped 21 feet 5 inches and the other record to fall was in the 800-yard run which Welch of Gothenburg stepped in 2 minutes 4 seconds. Watkins' other marks were:

- 220-yard dash: 24 seconds; 1/2-mile shut: 41 feet 9 inches; running broad jump: 19 feet 10 inches; high jump: 5 feet 8 1/2 inches.
