

Queen Louise to Becom Boarder at County Jail

Abdicates Throne for 60 Days at Request of Federal Judge Woodrough and Jury.

The self-styled "Queen of Omaha Bootleggers" abdicated her throne at 12 o'clock Friday.

After her announcement of abdication, she hurried to her home, where she will remain until next Monday, when she will conceal herself from the eyes of the populace for 60 days.

The queen, Louise Vinquist, who thinks no more of Congressman Volstead than she does of Robert Pierce Samardick, was ordered from her throne by Federal Judge Woodrough, before announcing that Louise would no longer rule any part of Omaha for at least 60 days. Woodrough asked Samardick whether he had any recommendations.

"Your honor," said Samardick, "I have nothing to say except the evidence as was introduced in the record of her case."

Woodrough ordered her to serve 60 days in the Douglas county jail and to pay a \$100 fine. Her sentence is to begin Monday and the officers were ordered to collect the fine on any property belonging to Louise.

After sentence was passed Louise broke down and cried.

Louise's attorneys have not yet decided whether they will appeal.

Louise was dressed in a new brown straw hat, brown spring tailored suit and patent leather shoes. On her right hand she wore a large diamond ring and on her left a wedding ring.

She was found guilty of five liquor counts Thursday by a jury in federal court following trial on a grand jury indictment.

Head of Chinese Yale Visits Here

Dr. Hume Is Guest of Honor at Country Club Banquet.

Edward H. Hume, Yale '91, president in China, the Yale university philanthropic medical school, is in Omaha as the guest of his classmate, Luther Koutz.

He was the guest of honor at a banquet at the Omaha Country club Thursday evening. Dr. Hume is a recognized authority on Chinese-American relations.

Since his graduation from Yale Dr. Hume has spent over a quarter of a century in China. The Yale in China of which he is president is a philanthropic school financed by Yale men. It has a staff of 100 doctors and 100 Chinese students. The school is composed of 27 buildings on a campus of 40 acres and was established 17 years ago.

The purpose of the institution is to turn a steady stream of doctors and nurses, western trained, into China, bringing light to the darkness of the Chinese medical practice.

German Blockade Scheme Proposed

Belgian Premier Suggests Plan as Substitute Guar- antee of Reparations.

London, May 2.—A proposal for an economic blockade of Germany through action of the league of nations, if Germany defaults upon her obligations in the Dawes plan, was proposed today by Premier Ramsay MacDonald today by Premier Theunis and Foreign Minister Hymans, of Belgium.

This proposal was made in order to satisfy the demand of Premier Poin care of France for guarantees.

Foreign office officials are optimistic over the visit of Belgian officials, believing it will accelerate the adoption of the experts' reparations report.

The Belgians explained the adjustments which the French believe necessary, especially the matter of keeping the German railways available for movement of occupational troops if such a movement is deemed necessary.

It was expected that Premier MacDonald would assent to minor adjustments.
