Chicago, May 5.—Wheat traveled an irregular trail today to higher levels.
Strength at Winnipeg was an early influence in the local pit, but prices gradually gave way, particularly at midday when locals sold on the disappointing decrease of the United States visible for the week. Commission houses absorbed offerings and a bulge featured the final minutes as shorts covered.

The decrease of 10,414,000 bushels in the Canadian visible supply of wheat was a influence in the late rally. Corn acted fairly well considering the ck of trade and the irregularity in the sh situation. The decrease of 1,720,000 shels in the visible supply for the week is a factor in the late firmness. New York Sugar.

New York, May 5.—Another decline of 1-15c was recorded in the local raw sugar market today, with spot quotations at 5.90c duty paid. Saies included 7.00c bags Philippines in port and 15.00c bags of Cuban for second half May shipment, all to local refiners.

Raw sugar futures were fregular. Atter declining 5 to 5 points on the active positions under scattered liquidation, due to the decline in spots, prices railied on covering and trade buying. The close was three points higher to one lower. May closed 4.23c; July, 4.23c; September, 4.37c; December, 4.65c.

Refined sugar also declined, owing to the cheaper raws, with fine granulated quoted from 7.60 to 7.70c.

Refined futures were nominal.

Chicago, May 5.—Following advances of 1/2 to 1c of all scores, the butter market today ruled steady with an unsettled undertone. Trading was very quiet as buyers were not following the advance. Some inquiry was reported on lower scores, supplies of which were light. The centralized car market was barely steady and dealers this afternoon found it easier to buy than to sell at above prices, especially 59 scores.
