Bridges Are Swept Away

Richmond, Va., May 12 .- One death resulted tonight from the most general flood Virginia has experienced n many years, when William Lucas was drowned at Fredericksburg while trying to rescue a small boat.

Serious flood damage was reported from many sections of Virginia today, with rivers and streams almost everywhere in the state already out of their banks or nearing flood stage as a result of the heavy rains of the last three days.

Mills Under Water.

Charlottesville, where seven bridges in and around the town have been washed away and several manufacuring plants flooded, appeared to have suffered the heaviest damage. With the Ravanna river 25 feet above normal, street railway and electric light service in the town was paralyzed. Damage to the plant of the Charlottesville woolen mills, where nearly all machinery is under water, was estimated at \$70,000

With the Shenandoah river higher than it has been for 50 years, widespread damage was reported in that river valley, while the Rappahannock is 14 feet above normal stage, and warnings of a rise in the James river have been issued here and at Lynchburg. Scores of residences in the lower sections along the Shenandoah are flooded and inhabitants in other threatened lowlands are removing their possessions.
