

End the Transportation Question—Read "Autos for Sale" Today

Girl Bobs Hair, Kills Self When She Is Scolded Places Muzzle of Shotgun to Bosom and Pushes Trigger With Yardstick.

Special Dispatch to The Omaha Bee. Falls City, Neb., May 17.—Anna Fupkes, 16, lies dead at her farm home, six miles northeast of here. She placed the muzzle of a shotgun against her bosom and pushed the trigger with a yardstick while she was alone in the house at 8 Friday night.

Her father, Fred Fupkes, was working at the barn. He is somewhat deaf and did not hear the report. Lying on sofa. Half an hour later when he entered the house he found the body of Anna lying on a sofa, a great hole torn through her heart, the shotgun and yardstick lying by her side, her bobbed hair tousled on the pillow.

Mrs. Fupkes was in Falls City attending the annual county grade spelling championship contest. Anna went to Falls City a few days ago and had her long tresses shorn in the latest mode. She wanted to be like the other girls, though there had been opposition to her having her hair bobbed.

Mrs. Fupkes admitted to county authorities that her daughter had been mildly scolded when she came back to the farm with her bobbed hair. But she said she didn't think the girl brooded over this.

Good Health, Cheerful. She was in excellent health and cheerful frame of mind the day of the tragedy. But the mother could assign no other reason. No inquest will be held, County Attorney F. N. Trout said. Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the little church at Werner, Anna's funeral will be held and she will be buried in the country churchyard.

She is survived by her parents, six brothers and a younger sister.
