There is the woman, for instance, who passes for one of the most elegant creatures this side of the court of St. James. She dresses exquisitely, never uses the wrong fork, has a cultivated taste for artichokes and caviare, but her manners are vile.

For one thing, you dread above everything else having to introduce her to a friend.

You instinctively know beforehand that you will suffer torturing humiliation and embarrassment. Should she eat with her knife or forget her friend, you could explain to your friends that the woman is worthy, but has lacked advantages.

But no, it is worse than that. You know that no matter whom you brought to her, she will never, no never, pause long enough in her absorbing self-interest even to comprehend another personality.

You may say with all the emphasis in the world: "This is Mrs. Blank, she is my dearest friend, I especially want you to know her. She is the world's leading authority on the sub-

ject in which you are the most interested," or "she is the wife of Prince Blank," or "she is the president of the University of X," but your words would not be heard. The individual with this particular type of bad manners, says "How do you do," and looks over the top of your head. She keeps right on talking about something your friend doesn't understand.

Does she pause in her preoccupation with self long enough to say to your friend who is a stranger, and a new comers—"How do you do, I see you, I comprehend you, I am willing for the moment at least to just seem to appear to be interested in you and what you stand for?"

She does not say, "We are glad to have you with us. How do you like our city—what have you to tell us of yourself or your city, your work or the things you know about which we don't know about?"

Oh, no, we don't expect to hear those sentiments in so many words. But we do expect that the person who understands the give and take of good conversation and of good manners will in some way imply that much interest.

But she does not. You leave her presence with your friend, like two small children who have been hustled into the corner with your backs to the wall.
