Library Chats

The Hoover War Library at Stanford university is one of the four largest collections of its kind in the world, ranking with the Imperial War Museum in London, the Weltkriegsbucherei at Stuttgart and the Musée de Guerre at Paris. Assembling of this material was begun by Prof. Adams immediately after the armistice was signed and has been prosecuted steadily ever since. The work has been intensified on the period of reconstruction all over the world, especially in Europe.

Dr. L. Wood Mead who was appointed recently as commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, is the author of two books, "Helping Men Own Farms," and "Irrigation Institutions." Dr. Mead has put into operation, both in California and in Australia, highly successful public settlement projects on reclaimed lands.

William Allen White's editorial on "Free Speech," which won the Pulitzer prize of \$500 for the best editorial of the year, is now out in book form. The volume is called "The Editor and His People" and contains brief pointed papers written by Mr. White for his editorial page.
