Neola, Ia., May 23.—The Omaha good will special pulled into Clarinda at dinner time last night, and here a stop was made until midnight.

For the first time on the trip the excursionists ran into rain, but there was no complaint.

Monteith, Glendon, Menlo, Stuart, Casey, Adair, Anita, Wiota, Marne, Walnut, Avoca, Hancock, Oakland, Carson, Shelby, Minden and Neola were the Iowa cities covered today.

This is counted as among the best sections of Omaha's trade territory, and the welcome was hearty.

It is from the territory covered today that the Omaha livestock market gets a great deal of its finest cattle and hogs.

School children were out in great numbers at every town visited.

"We look upon this visit as a part of education," said a teacher in one of the cities visited this morning.

Crops look fine over all the territory covered, and the rain of last night has given renewed assurance of a splendid harvest.

Fire Run Recalls Boyhood to Chief Rounding Out 50 Years in Omaha

Saturday Marks Semi-Centennial for Martin J. Dineen.

A few days ago Assistant Chief Martin J. Dineen of the fire department responded to an alarm from 1922 Cass street, a house occupied by William Kleeman.

He came to Omaha on May 24, 1874, just half a century ago. And while he was directing the work of extinguishing the fire at the old house at 1922 Cass street, his thoughts took flight to the days when the place was occupied by his school chum, Robert Curtis Williams, son of General Williams who was stationed at Fort Omaha.

Incidentally, the Cass street house was built in 1868 and is one of the oldest houses now in use here.

The chief has been with the fire department one-third of a century. When he began his service as a fire fighter, automobiles were not known here.

Washington, May 23.—Progressive republicans and democrats pressing the Howell-Barkley bill to supplant the railway labor board with a system of mediation and conciliation took a new turn in their fight in the house today.

Iowa Desperado Killed in Fight With Law Officer

Sheriff Drops Man Found Robbing Store—Dies Later in Sioux City Hospital.

By International News Service. Sioux City, Ia., May 23.—Art Kryiss, 31, caught red-handed early today at Maville, Ia., by Sheriff Paul T. Beardsley in the act of robbing a store, died at a Sioux City hospital today after being wounded by the sheriff with a sawed-off shotgun.

Police of Sioux City were tipped off that Kryiss probably would rob a Maville store. Sheriff Beardsley had men planted in the principal stores in the town.

Kryiss jumped a rear window at the store where Sheriff Beardsley was stationed. Kryiss crawled on his hands and knees to the front of the store and stood up with a .45 automatic in his hand.

Without giving the desperado a chance to surrender, Sheriff Beardsley wounded him in the hand. The bandit fled, turned and aimed at the sheriff, who fired again with his sawed-off shotgun. Kryiss was wounded in the abdomen.

In great agony, the gunman immediately surrendered and was taken to a Sioux City hospital, where his death occurred. Kryiss' accomplice escaped.

About a year ago a poolhall was burned at Maville, and a man lost his life in the flames. Kryiss was indicted for this crime, but has been a fugitive from justice.

Macy, Neb., May 23.—News of the death of Art Kryiss, 31, who was killed as a bandit in Maville, Ia., early today was received with great interest here.

Kryiss lived in this vicinity for six or seven years, engaged first in farming and later in the pool hall business. He sold out his interest in a local pool hall and then later built another hall a short distance away. Shortly after the construction of the second pool hall, the first burned down. August 22, 1923, and Abe Hamilton lost his life in the fire.

Kryiss was arrested charged with arson and was held in jail about three weeks on \$10,000 bond which was furnished by his brother. His trial was held in October last year and Kryiss is said to have been charged for lack of evidence.
