President Reports to Local League

The Omaha League of Women Voters met Thursday at the Y. W. C. A. for luncheon, with Mrs. Gentry Waldo, presiding.

The principal speaker was the state president, Mrs. LeRoy Davis of Lincoln, who, reporting on the national meeting of the league in Buffalo, April 24-29, said in part:

"Fifteen hundred women attended every conference and more than 2,000 all mass meetings.

"Noted national figures addressed the convention, Bruce Bliven, William Allen White, Senator Thomas Walsh of Montana, Norman Davis, Congressman Hamilton Fish, Gifford Pinchot and Senator Ritchie of Maryland, among them. Noted women there included Edith Picton Turberville of England, Commandant Marie Allen, head of women's police in London; Adelaide Plumtree of Toronto, Canada; Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt and Mrs. Gifford Pinchot.

"Nebraska had the most extensive nonpartisan information on candidates and issues of any state league group. Our 50-page pamphlet containing this information was a constant source of remark. It was distributed widely and has drawn many letters since the convention.

"Nebraska league was the subject of favorable comment on its defense of the direct primary in Nebraska.

Mint Julep.

A few sprigs of mint, one-half lemon, cold ginger ale, one-half glass cracked ice, one tablespoon powdered sugar.

Take leaves of the mint and bruise them in a glass with the rind of lemon, cut in thin strips, add juice of lemon, sugar, and place on ice for one hour to ripen and chill. When ready to serve place in tall glasses, with the ice, fill with ginger ale and serve with a sprig of mint.

Fruit Cobbler.
This is a southern favorite and can be made of preserved as well as of fresh fruit. Fare and quarter tart apples, dip each piece in melted butter, then roll it in spiced sugar. Have ready a crust-lined, shallow, square baking pan and fill with apples. Turn over them a half cupful of honey or maple syrup and an equal amount of water. Bake the cobbler until the apples are soft and the crust is done. Serve it hot with a little sweet cream or with whipped cream.

Peaches, fresh or canned, plums and large strawberries make excellent cobblers made practically the same way. The butter should be omitted in case of berries.
