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Farmer Who Hangs Onto Old Red Cow Is Losing Money, Statistics Prove

By P. S. PAGE. State College of Agriculture. Why does the average farmer, on a diversified farm, insist on keeping two or three poor cows instead of two or three good ones?

Let me tell you how the University of Nebraska Holstein herd got started. The Nebraska university is taking a leading place among breeders of dairy cattle, and particularly Holsteins.

Now here are some facts. The average farmer sells only cream, feeding the skim milk on the farm. For this reason he fails to get a better price.

The estimated production per cow of all the dairy cows in the United States is 4,000 pounds of milk and 100 pounds of butterfat a year.

Let us even stretch a point and say that you feed her alfalfa hay, instead of wintering her around that stack of fine nutritious straw, as do most farmers.

The object of the association is to promote the efficiency of its members, to weed out inefficient operators and to promote the social and business relations of its creameries in the vicinity of the state.

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Trade Expansion Lags, Report of U. S. Bank States

Backward Spring and Unsettled Political Situation Blamed for Slow Progress of Business.

Lincoln, June 1.—The volume of business in the Tenth Federal Reserve district is behind that of a year ago, says the monthly review of the Federal Reserve bank of Kansas City.

Continuing the report says: "Conservative buying by retailers from wholesalers continues to feature the mercantile trade, although the multiplicity of small orders is contributing to the making of a tremendous volume of goods distributed throughout the district."

The average sales of department stores for the month of April being 2.3 per cent below the average for April last year.

The May 1 forecast of the United States department of agricultural economics for the states of the Tenth district is encouraging in the situation.

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New Plane Flaps Wings Like Bird

Austrian Aviation Expert Thinks He Has Solved Takeoff Problems.

Vienna, June 1.—"The ideal flying machine" is claimed to have been invented by Dr. Raimund Nimmfuehr, one of the best known Austrian aviation experts.

He avers that his machine will constitute the cheapest form of communication, and that it will be able to imitate the flight of birds.

In an interview he said that by means of "pulsating planes" his machine will be able to rise and descend vertically and that, owing to a device which secures equilibrium, it will be automatically prevented from being upset or from crashing down.

According to Nimmfuehr, the wings can automatically move forward or backward and upward and downward, this work being done with an auxiliary motor.

Nimmfuehr calls his device for securing equilibrium a "mechanical brain." It will indicate changes of air pressure, measure the forces disturbing equilibrium and do other useful things now left to the skill of the pilot.

By the use of the pulsating wings the lifting power of the machine is such that it will rise from the earth without any preliminary run across the aerodrome.

BLIND EDITOR WINS LOVING CUP

Hartington, Neb., June 1.—According to information received by the Cedar County News, which won third place in the national community service contest for weekly newspapers conducted by the National Editorial association, another signal honor came to a Nebraska newspaper.

The silver loving cup was awarded to the Nebraska Signal, published at Geneva by Frank O. Edgecombe. The prize was awarded the best editorial page of any newspaper eligible in the competition.

A remarkable feature in this connection is the fact that Mr. Edgecombe, who writes the editorials, has been totally blind for a number of years, yet has edited the Geneva paper for 25 years.

The silver loving cup was donated by Wallace Odell, publisher of the Tarrytown (N. Y.) News, the retiring president of the National Editorial association.

THREE ESCAPE INJURY IN CRASH

Cosad, Neb., June 1.—Two men and a woman narrowly escaped death or serious injury when an automobile driven by Gilbert Emerson collided with an automobile driven by John MacShall on the Lincoln highway near here.

1,500 Farms Use Power

From Central Stations

Lincoln, June 1.—More than 1,500 Nebraska farms are now receiving electric current for light and power machinery through connection with centrally located stations, says a statement in the Nebraska committee on public utility information bulletin.

This is a great increase over the number of farms supplied but a few years ago, the statement says.
