

Platte Bridge to Be Built at Center Street

State Engineer Cochrane Casts His Ballot With Saunders County Officials; Claims Cost Less.

The new \$150,000 bridge over the Platte river connecting Saunders and Douglas counties will be built at the Center street location, State Engineer Roy Cochrane decided Saturday, and work will be started in an effort to have it completed this year.

Four Reasons.
The state engineer announced the following reasons for his decision in favor of the Center street location for the Platte river bridge:

The location is directly west of Omaha on main traveled road. It will cost less to connect the bridge with than with other roads suggested. There is less grading to do. There is better foundation material to carry the bridge.

3 CHILDREN BURN TO DEATH IN HOME

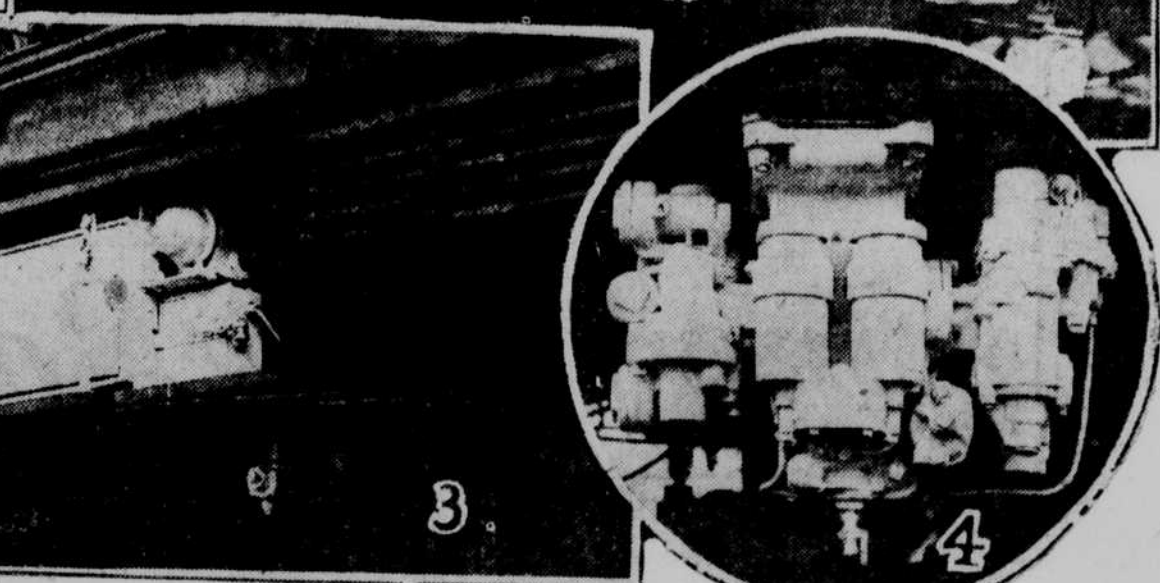
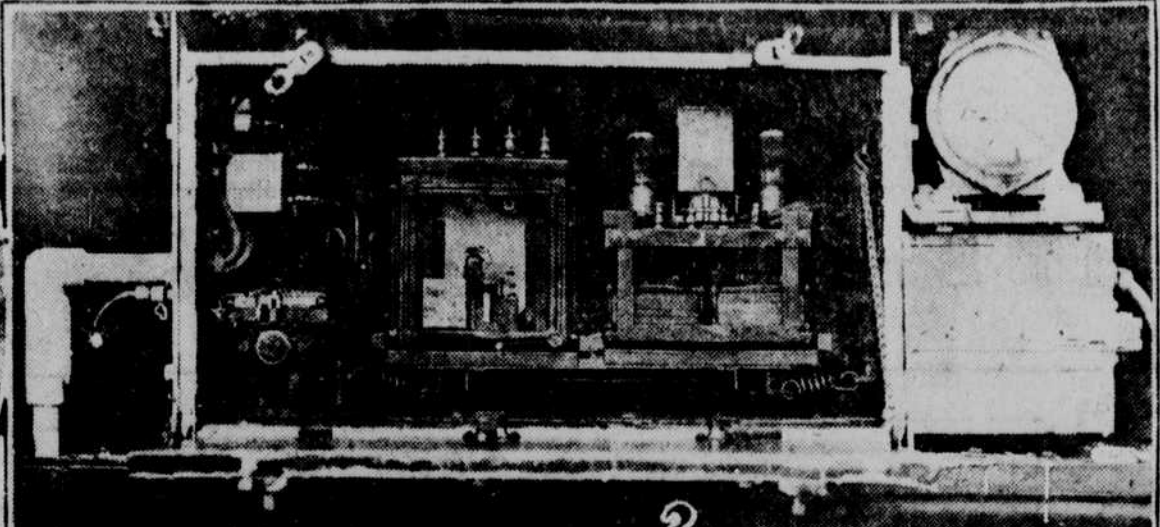
