

Democrats to Be Asked to Support Prohibition Laws

Christian Churches to Send Resolution to National Convention—Militarism Condemned.

Aurora, Neb., June 13.—With 303 delegates from outside churches registered from 57 churches, the state convention of Christian churches at Aurora this week was one of the most successful, both in attendance and in spirit, ever held. The resolutions committee, consisting of E. L. Rouse of Scottsbluff, chairman; Barton A. Johnson of Omaha; Victor M. Hovis of Lexington; E. O. Sweeney of Central City and Mrs. Frank Sandborn of Bethany, presented resolutions which were unanimously adopted by the convention. These resolutions, in part, follow:

We believe that the aims of the golden jubilee which our world is celebrating will be so inspiring to all workers at home and abroad, that every pastor to help the women to achieve their aims both as citizenship and as workers in the home and in the world-wide prohibition project.

We commend our college for the efficient work it is doing under the inspiring leadership of President Charles H. Coffey. We realize that its present financial position is one of adequate endowment. We therefore pledge our hearty support in the million-dollar endowment campaign which the trustees have asked the national board of management to inaugurate.

We recommend that the officers of this convention be authorized to send a resolution through Miss D. Smith asking the national democratic convention to include in its platform a plan supporting the 18th amendment and all laws supporting it.

We suggest that the pastors of the churches be asked to laymen and send their voters to the state secretary. The aim of this movement is to mobilize the laymen of the entire state that they may cooperate in and supplement the program of evangelism and conservation.

We utterly condemn militarism, wars of aggression and all other wars. Realizing that if world peace is to come it must come through education and the creation of a public opinion which demands peace, we therefore recommend that:

First, A certain day be set apart in Nebraska for the teaching of the principles of permanent peace and the dissemination of general information among the people and people of the world.

Second, We urge the national committee of the International Council of Religious Workers to provide for at least two sessions per year upon the study of peace and universal brotherhood.

Third, Furthermore, we are in accord with this society's support of any statesman, like move made in the interests of international peace.

MINNESOTA GAME, Fish Laws Given

Synopsis of Statutes Governing Lake Region Believed Accurate.

The following synopsis of Minnesota game and fish laws is believed accurate. It is published for the benefit of vacationists but The Omaha Bee assumes no responsibility.

(Game: Open season (dates inclusive). Prairie chicken and sharp-tailed grouse, no open season. Mallard duck and yellow legs, September 16 to December 31. Quail, October 15 to November 20. Mourning dove, September 15 to October 31. Redwing, October 1 to November 30. Male chukar, September 15 to October 31. Female chukar, October 15 to November 30. Partridge, October 15 to November 20. Plover, closed until 1927. Wild duck and goose, September 16 to December 31. Hairy woodpecker, September 15 to October 31. Hairy woodpecker and coot, September 15 to December 31. Deer, November 15 to November 29. Mink, November 15 to March 1. Muskrat, March 1 to April 29.

WARMER DAYS Intrigue Bass and Pike, Large Catches Reported

The warmer weather of the last few days has improved bass fishing in the lakes of north Nebraska and southern South Dakota. The bass have begun to rise from the sluggish state immediately following the spawning season and some large catches are again being reported.

From now on until the moss pollen pollutes the upper waters and the hot sun unduly warms the surface they will continue to strike the surface baits.

The formal opening of the bass season in South Dakota will be duly inaugurated with a fish day celebration on June 13 at Lake Andes, on the shores of the lake of that name, close to old Fort Randall, about 30 miles over the Nebraska line from either Nebraska, Lynch, Spencer, or Huron.

Lake Andes is perhaps the largest fresh water lake on the Mississippi and Missouri rivers to the Rocky mountains. It has a shore line of more than 50 miles.

The lake, early stocked with bass and pike, is nationally known and is recognized by sportsmen's magazines as one of the great bass and pike lakes of the country.

A number of fishing resorts dot its shores and there are numerous Indian and half-breed guides to tell you where the big ones are. These are remnants of the former Indian reservation population who have remained on the lake, the fishing is always good. Lake Andes bass average around two and one-half to three pounds and a number of five and six-pound ones are taken each year. Catching the limit is no trouble for either the bait caster or the fly fisherman, and the thrill of fighting a three-pound bass in a distance of 100 feet or more is almost if not quite equal to bringing him up to the landing net with a fly rod. Pike fishing also is good.

WASHOUT Halts Trains.

Beatrice, Neb., June 13.—Trains on the Beatrice-Nebraska City branch of the Burlington were unable to run beyond Nemaha City, Neb., today, because of a bad washout near Barney, Neb., along the Missouri river. It will be several days before the tracks can be repaired on account of high water.

Dependancy Cause of Suicide at Chadron

Chadron, Neb., June 13.—Dependancy over personal affairs was ascribed by a coroner's jury as the cause of the suicide of Henry Krauel, 36, Chadron engineer, who was found dead early this week in a hotel at Hot Springs, S. D., where he had gone for medical treatment. Authorities here, where Krauel's body was brought for burial, have been unable to locate relatives.
