



Old Mammals in Northwest

Burial Grounds of Prehistoric Men Found in Cherry County.

Fishing and hunting are not the only attractions for vacationers in north and west Nebraska. In Sioux county, in the extreme northwest corner of the state, at Agate, are fossil beds which annually attract scientists and tourists from all over the country.

Cherry county is the habitat of the smallest mammal in the world, a tiny mouse, and there also are found many species of flora and fauna known to no other parts of the continent. In the canyons and the valleys of the Niobrara and its tributaries the unearthing of bones of prehistoric animals and prehistorical men is common.

Seventeen miles northeast of Alins worth, where the hills begin to go down the Niobrara river, is Devil's gulch, a canyon 300 feet deep, the same in width and nearly one-half mile long. It is the graveyard of the mammoths, mastodons and their mammoths, if these monsters were domesticated when alive several million years ago.

From this gulch, E. H. Suhr and A. F. Dugger of the O'Neill high school faculty, and other scientists, have excavated bones of many animals of gigantic size and other bones plainly those of prehistoric men.

Comprised in their collection is one set of tusks more than seven inches in diameter at the base and seven feet in length.

For those who do not care about the past, but are after more exciting sport, the bass and pickerel are biting well in all of the Rock, Brown, Holt and Cherry county lakes.

Wheat Emerges With Gain After Irregular Day. Liverpool Strength and Canadian Rain Scarcity Stimulate Trade—July Corn Very Tight.

By CHARLES J. LEYDEN, Universal Service Staff Correspondent. Wheat gains today after a session of unusual irregularity. The strength of Liverpool and indications that rainfall over the Canadian northwest was insufficient were the stimulating factors.

Wheat closed 1 1/2c higher, corn was unchanged to 1/2c higher, oats were 1/2c higher. The market swung back and forth with equal rapidity. The wheat market was active, confirming sales of 50,000 bushels. Sales of 120,000 bushels of grain for August shipment also were reported.

Foreign interest was said to be buying futures in the Chicago pit today as well as Winnipeg. This has been going on for some time. The market was apparently a better indicator of the value of wheat receipts throughout the week.

The domestic milling demand had been active. Primary receipts were 1,148,000 bushels against 1,020,000 a year ago, but prices in all markets were weak. Stocks of wheat at Minneapolis for the week decreased 200,000 bushels.
