Since the Y. W. C. A. is a member of the Community Chest and Welfare Federation it has made a report at this time of some of the work done during the first six months of 1924, and which is made possible by the generous contributions of the citizens of Omaha.

It submits the following statistics of its free services: Travelers Aid—Total number served by the three workers, 4,648. Of this number 234 were children under 16 years of age and 517 were young people from 16 to 24 years of age. Number sent to temporary lodging, 572.
