Washington, July 14.—Chances of e presidential election of 1924 being brown into congress for decision ave been materially increased as a esult of the New York convention nd the grim earnestness with which enator La Follette has gone about he organization of his independent novement, in the opinion of political aders here.

Both republican and democratic eaders view the prospect with unasiness, for they say such a situaion, confusing enough ordinarily with its consequent disturbing effect n business, at this particular time and with this particular congress vould be confusion worse conbunded.

If La Follette makes good the prelictions of his followers in carrying inly Wisconsin, Minnesota and the wo Dakotas, it will give him 35 rotes in the electoral college. An wen fairly close election between Davis and Coolidge might turn the trick and prevent either from obaining the required 266, leaving La Follette the balance of power.
