

### Clubs Join in Campaign for World Fliers

#### Noonday Organizations Hop Into Band Wagon Calling for Routing of Birdmen Through Omaha.

The American round-the-world fliers will make their historic flight across the American continent through Chicago and Omaha over the regular air mail route, if increasing efforts of Omaha business and civic organizations succeed.

Service clubs of the city joined Saturday with the Chamber of Commerce and Ak-Sar-Ben in the effort to bring the famous fliers through Omaha, and already are planning a big celebration in honor of the birdmen and in recognition of their triumph in navigating the air completely around the world.

The celebration will probably be in charge of the united noonday clubs, with the co-operation of the Chamber, Ak-Sar-Ben and army and postal officials here.

**Steps Already Taken.**

Service clubs which have already taken steps to assure the presence of the fliers here are the Rotary, Lions and Continental. Members or officers of Concord, Triangle, Exchange, Optimist and Cosmopolitan clubs have also expressed a desire to get into the fight and to take part in receiving the fliers.

Montagu Tancock, manager of the Chamber of Commerce Bureau of publicity, has been investigating the possibility of bringing the fliers through Omaha, and is prepared to aid noonday service clubs in their concerted effort to place Omaha on the cross-continent itinerary.

"We are also planning an effort to have the British round-the-world aviator, Stuart McLaren, come through Omaha," said Mr. Tancock.

**Telegram Sent.**

Through the bureau of publicity the following telegram was sent Saturday to Col. Paul Henderson, second assistant postmaster general of the United States:

"We have urged General Patrick to route round-the-world fliers through Omaha. We feel that cities which have pioneered in furthering the establishment of air mail services are entitled to this recognition, especially as the post-office service has fields, emergency fields, supplies, equipment for giving the best service.

Omaha and Chamber of Commerce will greatly appreciate any further efforts you can put forth to gain army approval of this arrangement. Would point out that Omaha in addition to postoffice flying service, has complete army field."

**Edge Co-Operates.**

Randall K. Brown, chairman of the federal relations committee of the chamber, sent telegrams Saturday to Congressman Sears and Senator Howell of Omaha at Washington requesting that they ask Postmaster General New to urge Secretary of War Weeks to route the fliers over the air mail course, through Chicago and Omaha.

Carl Edge, general superintendent of all air mail service, has been asked to co-operate in the move to bring the fliers through Omaha, and has promised to do so.

Secretary R. B. Beach of the Chicago Association of Commerce, also was requested to bring Chicago's influence to bear in routing the fliers' historic and triumphal flight across the continent via Chicago and Omaha.

### Bishop F. T. Keeney Arrives in Omaha



### New Bishop Has Liberal Views

#### Favors Lifting Amusement Ban; to Preach First Omaha Sermon Sunday.

Bishop F. T. Keeney arrived in Omaha Saturday morning and immediately took up his new duties in the Omaha area of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Bishop Keeney is of medium height, inclined to stoutness. He is soft of speech, somewhat reserved, but inclined to smile in quite a friendly fashion frequently.

The new bishop was assigned to the Omaha area by the recent general conference in Springfield, Mass. Saturday was, he says, the first time he ever got off a train in Omaha.

**Favors Lifting Ban.**

"I am confident, however, that from my standpoint the assignment here will be a most pleasant one," said Bishop Keeney. "I have never heard anything but good about the Omaha area."

Asked concerning his opinion on the lifting of the ban on dancing, the theater and card playing at the recent conference in Springfield, Bishop Keeney said:

"I am entirely in accord with the conference on its action. I believe that it was a mistake to catalogue sins, for what is dangerous in one country may not be in another one. The document cataloguing sins pertained largely to the United States, yet it was applied to the world.

"The conference made a strong statement against card playing, the theater and dancing, but left the individual against it to the local action. It is no longer possible to put people on trial for indulging in them, while under the old legislation it was possible to actually bring an offender to trial, although it was never done.

**Quotes John Wesley.**

"I think rules of conduct may best be based on the statement of John Wesley: 'Abstain from forms of amusement that can't be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus.'"

Bishop Keeney was made a bishop four years ago in Des Moines, Ia., and on his own request he was sent to China, where he has been for four years. Climatic conditions there led to his return, as he was in the south of China, in a latitude the same as from the heat. Mrs. Keeney is in the east, but will join the bishop here in the fall, he said. They have one daughter, who is a missionary in a Methodist women's college at Fochow, China.

The bishop will preach his first sermon in Omaha Sunday morning in First Methodist church. He will preach Sunday evening at Dietz Methodist church.

### BRITISH HEAR U. S. BEHIND DEBT PLAN

A note he left in his room indicated, the coroner said, that he had committed suicide by jumping from the window. He had been in ill health.

### Man Buys Book He Lost 52 Years Ago; Finds Signature on Fly Leaf

Middletown, N. Y., July 19.—Fifty-two years ago Hector Sinclair of El Dorado, Kan., lost a prized copy of the writings of the Jewish historian, Josephus.

He searched for the book for years and recently he learned that he could acquire a similar copy at a second-hand bookstore at Albany. He paid \$2.50 for the book and looked at the flyleaf. He found on it his own name, written there more than half a century ago.

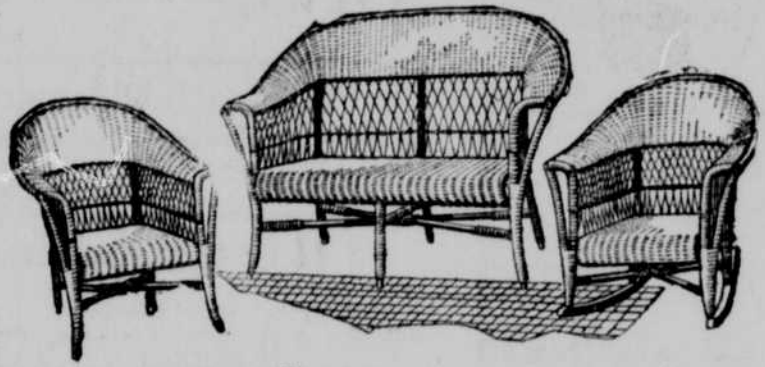

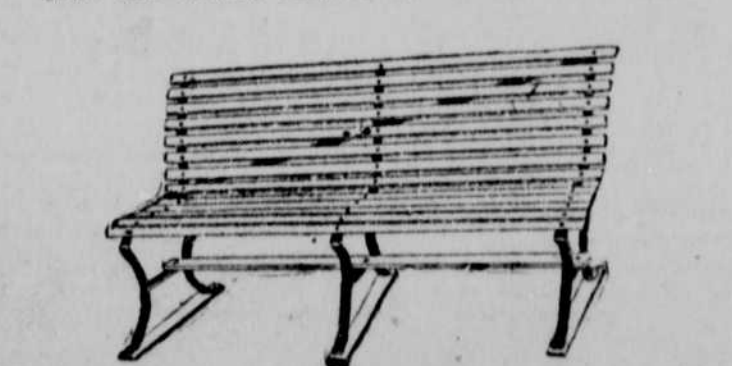

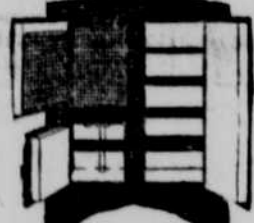
