Expresses Hope in Meet

London, July 20.—The reparations experts' work must be approved because it is the practical, economic and common sense basis for bringing order out of chaos in Europe.

His message follows: "Our work must be and will be approved by the people of the world because personal considerations were always buried in our efforts to point out a practical, economic and common sense basis for the future cooperation between the allies and Germany."

"It is my prayer and expectation that the important conference now in session will demonstrate that the nations are facing away from chaos with a sincere determination to found an enduring, Christian peace, based upon common good faith."

Sell Slowly Now, Advice to Farmer

Can Promote Best Interests by Not Rushing Grain to Elevator, Say Business Men and Economists.

Hold for Better Price

Omaha business men, as well as economists throughout the country, agree that this is an advantageous time for the farmer to sell their grain slowly and thus enjoy the profits which would otherwise go to the elevator men.

The increase of 30 cents for American wheat June 12 has created a rosy situation for the wheat growers of the country.

"The farmer who can afford to do so should hold his wheat for a better price," said A. L. Schantz, president of the State Bank of Omaha. "It will be better for the country in general not to dump a lot of wheat on the market at one time, particularly at this early date. Such a movement would tend to lower the price. Distribute the delivery over a period of time; that is what will hold the price firm."

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Persia "Sorry" for Slaying of American Envoy

Note of Regret to Be Delivered by Legation at Capital.

Washington, July 20.—Instructions were received by the Persian legation from its government to express to the Washington government its deep regret over the killing of Vice Consul Robert Imbrie by a native mob at Teheran and to state that the Persian government will "do all in its power to fulfill its duties in this case."

The instructions were received at the legation while American government officials were awaiting further advice from Joseph A. Kornfeld, its minister at Teheran, concerning the case. A thorough investigation was being made, it was stated, but as yet there was no disposition on the part of the Washington government to attempt to fix the responsibility for the murder either on the Persian government or Teheran authorities.

Copenhagen, With 700,000 Persons, Has 1,000 Police

River Takes Main Street for Channel

Loup Roaring Through Heart of Pleasanton—Town Covered Three Feet With Water.

Walks Carried Away

Keareny, Neb., July 20.—Citizens of Pleasanton today are engaged in restoring order in their homes and places of business, unmindful of the fact that flood waters are still covering their streets and a new channel of the Loup river, 30 feet wide and 15 feet deep, is roaring through the heart of the village.

The water, which reached a depth of three feet over the entire business and residence portion, has receded sufficiently to reveal the enormity of damage done. In the wake of the new channel everything has been ruined or carried away. Heaviest losses were sustained by the Tolfeisen Elliott Lumber company and the Wort elevator, a portion of the latter being carried away, the remainder being almost a total loss.

The crown of all streets, concrete crossings and hundreds of feet of cement walk have been carried away by the flood. Undercurrents still cover the sandy loam, dropping walks, paving and buildings into holes created. The village jail, of concrete block construction, almost disappeared in one of these holes. On the main street the flood current washed a hole 12 feet deep under one business block.

Coolidge Visits Birthplace of First President

Nation's Chief Unrecognized by Crowd as He and Family Wait at Pier for Mayflower.

Washington, July 20.—President Coolidge's first "landing party" from the yacht Mayflower since he has been in the White House took place this morning at a deserted spot on the Virginia shore of the Potomac.

Before leaving Washington yesterday afternoon on the presidential yacht, Mr. Coolidge had made known his intention of visiting the birthplace of George Washington, at Wakefield, Va. Accordingly, a White House automobile sped west from the capital, arriving at Wakefield in time to meet the president.

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TEREHAN IN GRIP OF MARTIAL LAW

Teheran, Persia, July 20.—Martial law has been declared here. Several persons suspected of complicity in the killing of the American vice consul, Robert Imbrie, who died Friday from injuries received when he was beaten by a fanatical mob while he was photographing a sacred fountain, have been arrested.

Lava Again Flowing From Hawaiian Volcano Crater

Honolulu, July 20.—Lava began flowing in the crater of Halemaumau yesterday afternoon for the first time since the severe eruptions in May. Lava fountains, including Old Faithful, began shooting their tongues from 50 to 200 feet high, over a radius of several acres. Reflections from these displays have been visible for miles.

9000 Names Hard to Get, Say Friends

Declare Lyman Wheeler Is Seeking to Win Himself Place on City Commission.

K. K. K. in Background

"Not worried." This is the attitude of Henry W. Dunn, commissioner of police, toward the recall plan of former police Captain Lyman Wheeler.

"The people of Omaha," said one of the commissioners close associates, "will realize that this scheme of Wheeler's is a two-edged thing. There are two issues before the scheme. First, the purpose is to secure the recall, the ousting from office of Henry Dunn, second, the purpose is to elect Lyman Wheeler in his place."

No Reason for Election. It has only been a few months since Commissioner Dunn was triumphantly re-elected a member of the city commission. The city council again gave him charge of the police department. The affairs in the department are running as smoothly now as they were prior to and at the time of the last election, say Dunn's friends. This being true, what reason can there be for subjecting the city of Omaha to the expense of a special election.

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Auburn Hotel Proprietor for 25 Years Drops Dead

Wichita, Kan., July 20.—William Welch, proprietor of the Millar hotel here for the last 25 years, dropped dead this morning from heart disease. He was 55 and has been prominently identified with civic affairs, having twice been mayor of the city, filling the unexpired terms of two mayors who died in office.
