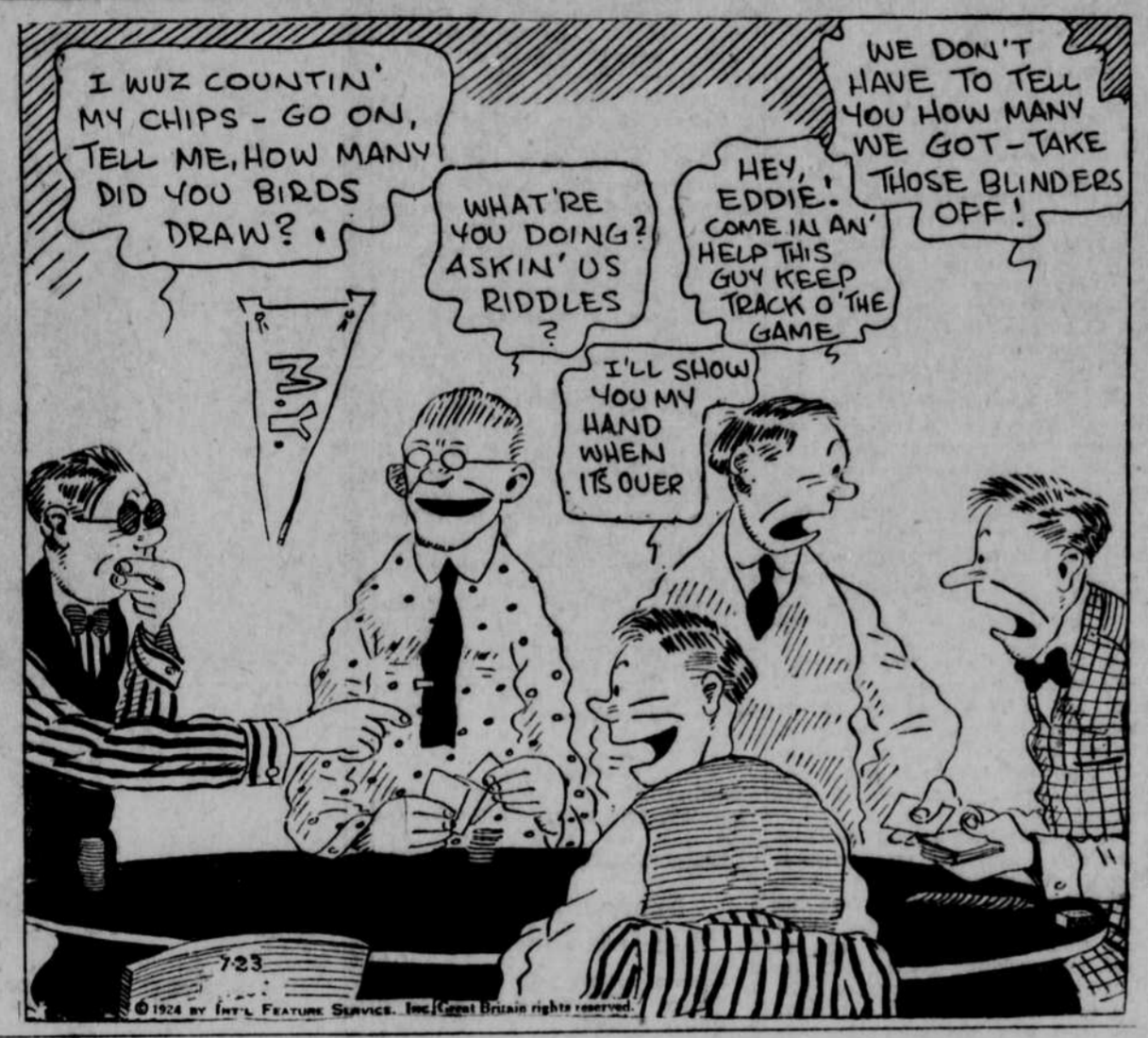
Dorelto Favorite to Win
