The lar district is that it is typical in value and farm operations to the middle western farming section in which the bank transacts most of its ousiness. This land is valued at \$200

As a result of the survey the bank reports that 58.3 per cent of this 80 ections is free from debt. Of the emaining 41.7 per cent of the 51,200 acres but 5.6 per cent are encumbered carry a debt of \$100 or less an acre; 13 per cent are encumbered for \$75 in acre or less, and 12.6 per cent for \$50 an acre or less.

The survey further substantiates he opinion of economists and financial experts that whatever difficulties the farmer may have suffered, the remedy is in his own hands, and that agriculture of the middlewest is working out its own solution to the prob lem without interference from the dministration of any so-called political "cure-alls."




