John Redick, State Champion, and Sam Reynolds, Former State Titleholder, May Play National Golf Stars in Exhibition Match—Visitors Will Play 36 Holes, 18 in Morning and Same Number in Afternoon.

Two of the best golfers in the country, Cyril Walker, national open champion, and Bobby Cruikshank, runner-up for the open title, will play exhibition matches over the Omaha Field club course.

Walker and Cruikshank will play 18 holes in the morning and another 18 in the afternoon. They will play in Sioux City, August 10 against Ruddy Knepper, Sioux City golf star and Mike Shearman, professional of the Sioux City Country club.

Walker won the national open this year. Cruikshank was runner-up to Bobby Jones for the title in 1923. He tied with Jones and in the play-off lost the championship.
