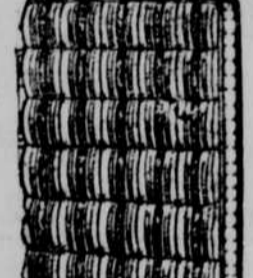

Afflicted Omaha Youth, 27, Finds Solace in Books, Making Violins

By J. T. ARMSTRONG. They call him "Benny" at the Postal Telegraph company. His full name is Benjamin A. Retynski. He's 27 years old and lives with his aged mother at their home at 3705 Castelar street. All of which is merely preliminary to a story which should inspire those with the most forlorn hopes; a story in which a poor, sickly little Polish boy conquered his adversities and struggled to an ultimate happiness. "Benny" was born in Omaha and attended grade school here. His parents had come to this country from



Warsaw, were in poor circumstances and on the death of his father, "Benny" found it necessary to go to work. It was only a short time after this that "Benny" became afflicted with a terrible sickness. His bones softened until he became stooped and hunched-backed. He lay for three years in an hospital without being able to stir. In all, he has spent some eight years in hospitals, and only a wonderful but most hazardous operation made it possible for him to become active again. This operation, performed on him several years ago, consisted of removing part of his skin bones and using them to brace his stiffened spinal column. When finally he was able to leave his bed he did so eagerly, anxious to aid his mother but realizing his physical handicaps and resigned to the fact that it would be

Impossible for him to participate in the pleasures which other young men find. Turns to Books. "Benny" became a telegraph operator. Indeed, he became an exceptionally capable operator, according to J. G. Wolf, manager of the Postal. And, although it tires him, "Benny" has for several years worked a regular eight-hour shift each day, and has been able to buy a home for his mother and himself. It was after hours that "Benny" found his physical weakness making him despondent. It was then that he

had time to realize how badly fate had treated him, and fearing to brood over it, he turned to the books with which he had become familiar during his long periods in the hospital. He also began playing a violin, and although the music saddened him it soothed him. He became interested in the instrument, studied its history and the lives of famous violin makers. He avidly read stories of Stradivarius and his great rival, Guarnerius, who lived in Cremona, Italy, and made violins which present-day makers despair of equalling. Into Another World. The glossy brown varnish on the violins of Stradivarius and Guarnerius charmed him, and the lost formula for the varnish, caused him to ponder and then begin to experiment. Now he has a formula which produces a varnish similar to that used by Stradivarius. With the aid of Jerome Carter, veteran Omaha violin maker, he began fashioning instruments and during the last 10 years he has found time to make nine of them. "I haven't been able to realize much profit making them," said "Benny." "That is, monetary profit. But the necessity of study and work connected with it has been most valuable to me. When I get through my work I step into another world; a world of good books and music which makes me forget my infirmities. It is the only way."
