Chicago, Aug. 6 .- With lowering skies threatening still further downpours today, rivers throughout the middlewest were slowly rising to flood stage as a result of the heavy streets of many cities were flooded. Early this afternoon five more deaths were added to the storm and flood toll around Milwaukee, bringing the total to 11.

As the day wore on, the situation in the upper Milwaukee river valley became more serious-the worst in its history. The river is rapidly rising. Residents of villages in the vicinity of Fond du Lac are fleeing their homes, as continued heavy rains threaten dams between there and Campbellsport. Many sections of the country were littered with ruins wrought by excessive rainfall and cyclonic winds. Three are drowned at Fond du Lac, and three children lost their lives in the swollen creeks about Milwaukee. Damage to the territory in a radius of 200 miles of Chicago will run into the millions.
