

Champion Benny Leonard to Meet Pal Moran in Ten-Round Bout Monday Night

Lightweights to Battle in Main Go at Cleveland

Moran Serving as Trial Horse for Lightweight, Who Is Matched to Fight Walker on August 20.

CHAMPION Benny Leonard, the plan, turf operator and incidentally lightweight champ of the world, has scheduled two bouts in the next ten days that will prove conclusively whether a champion can enjoy a long rest period and return to the ring possessing the same old skill that made him the greatest fighter of his weight and inches recorded in the history of pugilism. Leonard will meet Pal Moran, one of the leading challengers for the light weight crown, in Cleveland Monday night as a feature of this week's boxing program. August 20 he will clash with Mickey Walker in New York in a scheduled fifteen-round encounter for the welterweight crown.

Moran is serving as a trial horse for Leonard. The lightweight champion would not care to enter the ring with Walker to battle for a crown that he has sought for years without first trying his skill against a good fighter, as a preparatory measure. He could not have picked a more worthy foe for such a test.

Moran has been rated for some time as one of the leaders of the brigade of challengers who have been camping on Benny's trail but have not shown sufficient class to cause promoters to offer large sums for their services. Undoubtedly Leonard would not have been induced to enter the ring with the New Orleans entry for the price the Cleveland promoters are giving except for the mere fact that he has to put one good fight under his belt before he looks up with Walker.

This is not the first time Moran has met Leonard. When he was a beginner, back in 1920, he met the champion in a ten-round decision bout and was outpointed by a safe margin. Leonard was right at the height of his form at that time and was so far superior to other lightweights that he was considered in a class by himself. Early in 1922 they met again in New Orleans with the same result.

Since that contest Moran has improved greatly. He has defeated Lew Tendler, Johnny Shugrue, Johnny Mendelssohn, Finley Mitchell and a number of good fighters, including Harry Brown, Joe Tiptitz and Bobby Barrett. He lost decisions to Jack Bernstein, Lew Tendler and Jimmy Goodrich.

If Leonard were at his best he would have no trouble outpointing a fighter like Moran, but there is much doubt in the minds of close students of boxing whether Benny can display the skill that he did when he was at his best. Long periods of idleness are not good for champions and Benny has been out of the ring for a long time. He has been appearing on the stage and in the movies and living a life of ease.

There are several other bouts in this week's schedule that are of interest to followers of boxing. The chief one will be Jack Remick faced by some of the coming heavyweight champion, in action against Barthly Madden at Long Island City, Madison a hard headed running back who recently fought Harry Wills and made such a good showing against the negro that he nearly crabbled Wills' fight with Luis Angel Firpo.

Remick is a Canadian. He first attracted attention when he was a sparring partner for Dempsey. His showing against Dempsey in camp was so good that he immediately acquired a manager and started out after his former employer's crown, although the road to date has not been any too easy.

LA FOLLETTE TO PLAN CAMPAIGN

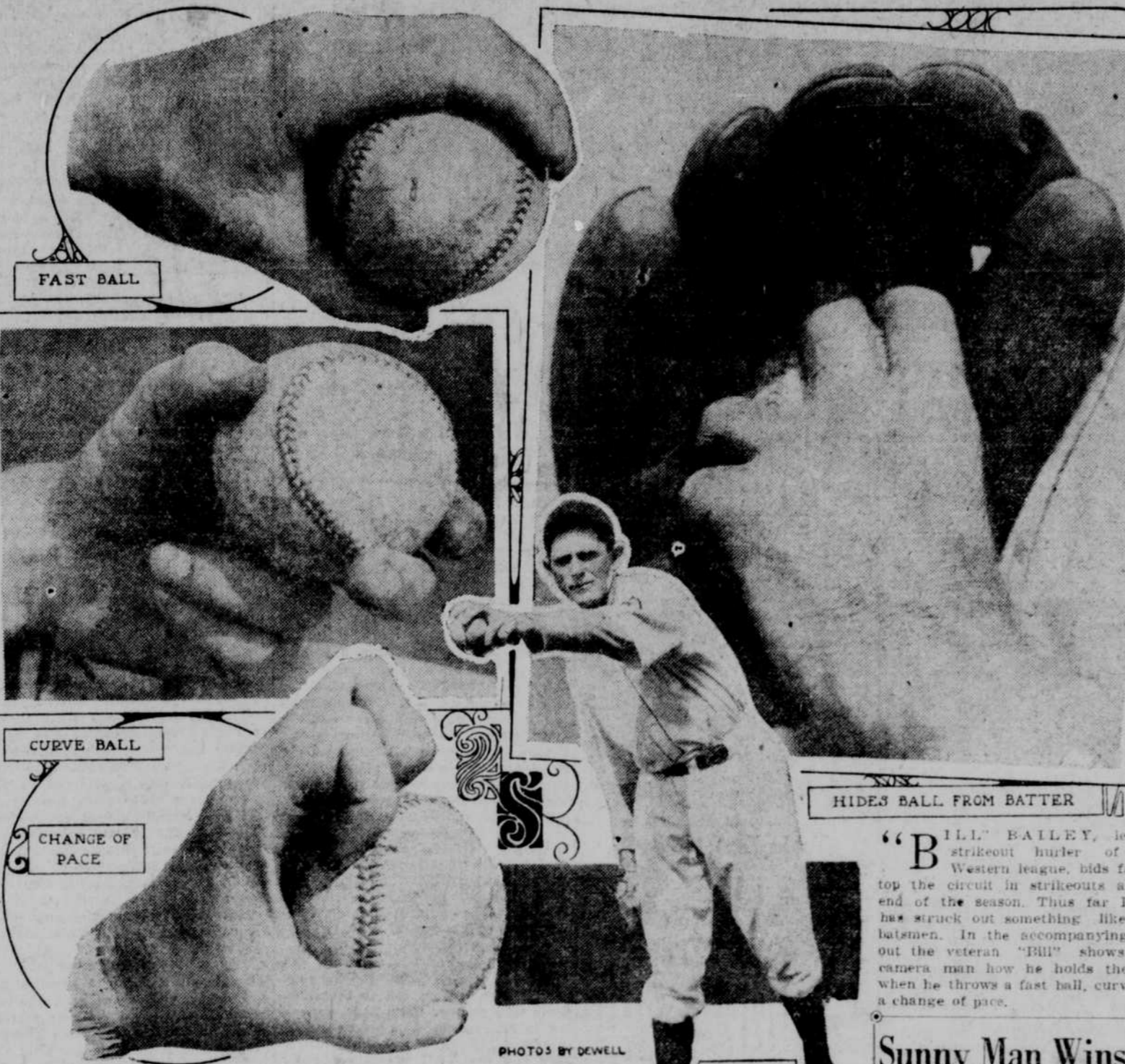
