New Yorkers Stem Tide in Third Meet With Washington

35,000 Fans Flock to Stadium for Deciding Game of Series.

Yankee Stadium, New York, Aug. 30 .- Singles by Pipp and Meusel with sacrifice sandwiched in between, in the ninth inning, this afternoon, decided a hot pitchers' battle between Hoyt and Ogden, the Yankees winning, 2 to 1.

Waite Hoyt was selected by Miller Huggins to oppose Washington in the hird game of the series. Ogden was named to pitch by Manager Harris. Thirty-five thousand fans were in the stands. The batting order of the Yankees was changed just before the game started, Pipp replacing Meusel in the cleanup position.
