U. S. Troops Will Honor Globe Fliers

Pershing Orders Parade of All Units in Washington District; Guns Will Roar National Salute.

To Visit Historic Tomb

Washington, Sept. 8.—Preparations to receive the army world fliers on their arrival in Washington tomorrow were given a national character today when General Pershing issued personal orders directing that troops in the Washington district be paraded at their posts at the time the air squadron circles over the city and that suitable military honors be paid.

Shanghai, Sept. 8.—Eleven hundred marines from foreign warships this morning were ordered to land in Shanghai at 4 a. m. and take up defensive positions on the boundary of the international settlement.

National Gun Salute

At District of Washington headquarters, staff officers were busy tonight preparing for a noisy welcome when the air squadron leaves in sight. A national salute of 45 guns, the highest honors paid in the American military service, will be roared out by field guns stationed on the Ellipse back of the White House as the fliers separate from the escorting squadron and swing by overhead, bound for Arlington National cemetery across the Potomac to pay their own tribute to the tomb of America's Unknown Hero before they pass on to their landing at Bolling field.

Both Brakes Fail

YOUTH ESCAPES FROM JAIL AT O'NEILL SECOND TIME

O'Neill, Neb., Sept. 8.—Jerome Jones, under sentence of from one to 10 years in the state reformatory, broke jail here Sunday night for the second time in three weeks and has not yet been recaptured. Jones had escaped from an Iowa reformatory before coming here. His apprehension here followed a charge of auto and horse stealing and larceny breaking near Stuart. It is alleged he robbed several houses near Inman immediately following his first escape from the local jail. He is six feet tall, weighs 170 pounds, is 17 years of age, has light complexion, with a small pony scar in the center of his forehead near the hair. He combs his hair pompadour.
