Appointments for the Coming Year Will Be Announced Next Monday. Clarinda, Ia., Sept. 17.—The 65th session of the Des Moines annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church convened here today. Bishop F. T. Keeney of Omaha presiding. Registrations are being made hourly, many ministers from 225 towns represented coming by auto. The six-day session will close Monday afternoon, September 22, with appointments of ministers for the coming year in southwest Iowa. The board of examiners met Tuesday for examination of undergraduates. Dr. H. E. Slothower of Jefferson, dean of the school of theology of the conference, is chairman of this board and Dr. David J. Shenton of Winterset registrar. Four men graduate this year who have preached the entire four years, and will be ordained elders this fall and given appointments at this conference. They are Patrick J. Allwell, Fontenelle; Ernest B. Borst, Conway; Paul H. Hicks, Nodaway; and William H. Warrior, Prescott. Ten young men came before the board for admission on trial. There are 28 undergraduates, and 16 who

constitute the board of ministerial training. The board and undergraduates were banqueted at Hotel Linderman Tuesday night. Dinner talks were given by Bishop Keeney, Dr. A. E. Slothower, Dr. D. J. Shenton, Dr. Fred W. Willis and W. H. Warrior. Conference proper opened today with sacrament of the Lord's Supper. E. S. Mencher gave the address at the memorial service. Bishop Keeney will deliver the morning devotional address each day, and the afternoon evangelistic address will be by Dr. A. ### Wesley Is Given Stay From Chair

**Omaha Negro Will Not Be Executed Till Further Examination.**  
Sol Wesley, Omaha negro, will not die September 26 for the murder of W. M. Deerson, District Judge Goss Wednesday issued an order postponing the execution "till the further order of the court." Wesley began acting abnormally several weeks ago and since then has not spoken a word. Judge Goss was summoned by Warden Fenton. He called into consultation a committee of experts consisting of Drs. W. S. East, D. G. Griffith and George E. Charlton, superintendents of the three state hospitals for the insane. They reported to the judge that Wesley is "mentally inaccessible" because he will not talk or answer questions, but sits gazing into space, clasping a Bible to his breast. They are unable to determine whether or not he is sane. Wesley is to be observed in the future and when the doctors decide he is sane they will report to the judge, who will then again impose the death penalty. Wesley was convicted of the murder of W. M. ### RAIN FALLS OVER MUCH TERRITORY

Wymore, Neb., Sept. 17.—Rains covered southern Nebraska and northern Kansas Monday, according to railway reports received here. Wymore received about one-half inch, the heaviest rain here for several weeks. Considerable hail accompanied the rain in the Reynolds, Chester and Angus and Edgar vicinity, but little damage was done. Hailstones remained on the ground at Edgar and Angus for four hours. "Columbus, Neb., Sept. 17.—Continued fall rains accompanied by low temperatures retard corn growth, leaving half of the crop four weeks behind. Hay and winter wheat are benefited. Beatrice, Neb., Sept. 17.—A few farmers in Gage county resumed their fall plowing, following the recent rains which had a tendency to soften up the ground. More rain is needed to soak the subsoil and there will be little seeding of winter wheat until more moisture falls. Ellsworth, Neb., Sept. 17.—A decided trace of frost made its appearance in this section Monday night. As warming breezes followed immediately thereafter no harm was done maturing vegetation. ### Dawes to Speak in Northwest

Republican Vice Presidential Nominee Home From Legion Convention. Evanston, Ill., Sept. 17.—Charles G. Dawes, republican vice presidential nominee, returned today from his visit to the American Legion convention in St. Paul to spend two days at his home here conferring with party campaign managers and preparing for a second invasion of the northwest with a speech Friday night at Sioux Falls, S. D. The conferences planned with Chairman Butler and other campaign managers have to do with tentative proposals for a two weeks' speaking trip by the vice presidential nominee, beginning early in October, and extending in to the Pacific northwest. The trip as being planned, will be the first stumping tour undertaken by Mr. Dawes, and will include several rear platform speeches in the smaller towns. The itinerary has not been completed, but it is understood that half a dozen or more states will be visited, including probably Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, Montana, Washington and Oregon. Mr. Dawes' efforts will be concentrated probably in the last three states named.
