

Storms Marking Equinox Coming

Snow in Three Northwestern States, Cold Wave Expected to Move Eastward.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Approach of the equinox brought a touch of winter to the northwest today.

Snow was reported in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho.

Storms were reported from the southern states.

Hot Springs, Ark., was the first place to report a cyclone. This evening a storm broke over the city, wrecking a church and damaging the Eastman hotel, noted as a winter resort.

The southern storm was apparently moving eastward and was reported in Mississippi and east Tennessee tonight.

The cold wave from the northwest will move eastward in the rear of the southern storm, weather charts indicated.

Chicago was sopping wet tonight, rain having fallen for several hours. The temperature was nearly normal.

Winters may be expected when the cold wave approaches the Great Lakes region, probably by Sunday.

The cold weather in the northwest was unusually severe for this season of the year. In parts of Wyoming four inches of snow have fallen and snow flurries were reported from several places in Montana.

Unsettled weather usually prevails during the equinox—that period when days and nights are of equal length. On Sunday the nights will start growing longer than the days, and will continue to grow longer until December 22, when the days begin to lengthen again.

Since January 1 of this year there has been a deficiency of 712 degrees in Chicago's normal temperature.

Temperatures have been below normal over most of the six months. Temperatures for the next six months continue as low proportionately as they have through the summer months the winter will be severe in the northern latitudes.

Liberal Increase in Japan Is Cause of Concern Over Who Rules

Tokyo, Japan, Sept. 20.—Who are the new genro of Japan, the secret rulers by whose direction the government is more or less permitted to carry on its affairs of state? This question has been a sore point for many years since a so-called nationalist cabinet went into office, with Premier Viscount Kato at its head, in June of this year.

Who are the genro of Japan? A falling Prince Matsukata, buried up by Prince Saionji, another genro who finds it difficult to be a close adviser to the throne, with the people of Japan out and against him? Those in the cabinet who call for liberalism, the recognition of soviet Russia and the spread of democracy? Or is the new genro system to be represented by Toyama, Miura and Uchida, men who claim no interest in material wealth, no particular desire for political prestige, but make their appeal to the patriotic Japanese whose empire is in danger of slipping backward? Toyama, Miura and Uchida, the first a man who dared to threaten Prince Yamagata, the most powerful autocratic genro of them all; the second a man who by questionable means aided his country in the annexation of Korea; the third a political opportunist? Who is the genro of Japan?

These men were Mitsuru Toyama, "Robin Hood of Japan," as he has been called, a man who is claimed to be the great influence of Japanese masses, who put the state above all else; Shinya Uchida, a political opportunist, who sees in the shifting of Japanese nationalism a chance for advancement politically by political patriotism; and, most powerful of all with a large circle of friends, Lieutenant Kwanji Miura, one-time privy councillor, but, of more importance, Japanese minister to the court of Korea in 1915—a Japanese minister who was tried for and later acquitted for complicity in the murder of the queen of Korea. No matter whether or not General Miura was involved in the murder of the queen, it is known that Japan's annexation of Korea came later, and it is equally well known that the activities of General Miura in Seoul, Korea aided in the taking over by Japan of this great colonial possession.

Japan, has moved forward greatly so far as interest in the outside world is concerned. In the elections of June the people who voted—it was not a matter of equal suffrage, but rather an expression of a very small percentage of the people—chose to return to power the Kenmei party, which is avowedly for equal suffrage and protection of the constitution granted Japan by the great Emperor Meiji. Pershing Sends Formal Farewell

Last General Order Addressed to "My Comrades" Will Be Read at All Posts.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 19.—General Pershing's formal farewell to the army, written in the form of the last general order he signed on his birthday, September 13, which will be read to every army organization abroad, The premier himself is a man most famous as the foreign minister, who in 1914 sent over to Peking the demands famous as "the 21 demands," and thus did his bit toward the extension of Japan's control in the far east. The foreign minister, Baron Shidehara, once ambassador to the United States, is brother-in-law of the premier, and the foreign minister's opening statement to the press contained phrases which were of no mean strength. LASSEN RAINS ASHES ON TOWN

Redding, Cal., Sept. 19.—Mount Lassen, California's live volcano, is again in pronounced eruption. It was observed with the break of dawn today, but the greatest force of eruption probably was in the darkness of night. The great ebullition of black smoke was obscured partially in a haze from the east as the sun rose. The cloud of smoke was more heavily laden with ashes than is common with Lassen's eruptions. Ashes are reported to have fallen on the roofs and porches of the hotel at Viola like a heavy frost. The eruption today was witnessed by hundreds of passengers on through trains between the northwest and California.

Waters' execution will be the last hanging in Georgia, his sentence having been passed before the new law substituting electrocution as the means of capital punishment.
