

Proposed Arms Meet Approval by Methodists

Conference Votes to Merge With Northwest Nebraska Body; Now Largest in U. S.

Hope that the United States would participate in the general disarmament conference next June was expressed by members of the 12th annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church of Nebraska at the close of their meeting Monday afternoon.

The only reference made to disarmament was when Rev. H. E. Huntington, Lincoln, who presented the resolution on the subject, remarked that the committee was so hopelessly divided that no recommendation could be made.

The general conference resolution calls upon America to lead the way to world peace. It urges conscription of capital and labor as well as soldiers in the event of another war.
