They entertained the king and queen of Belgium at dinner at Claridge's restaurant Tuesday.

Mrs. Harry Brown also has many autumnal social plans, but is not likely to take Norfolk House again, because the young duke of Norfolk will be entertaining there this winter. There are so many Americans still in town that Mrs. Kellogg, wife of the American ambassador, intends to resume her weekly at homes at Crewe House.

King George and Queen Mary will be back at Buckingham Palace Monday at the same time. A part of Buckingham palace has been converted into a small apartment for the use of the young couple, as White Lodge at Richmond proved too far away for the night-loving duke and duchess.
