

Prices of wheat Drop, Closing at Bottom Levels

Valiant Attempts to Overcome Sharp Break at Liverpool Fail; Other Grains Also Decline.

By CHARLES J. LEYDEN, Universal Service Staff Correspondent. Chicago, Oct. 10.—After several valiant attempts to overcome the sharp break at Liverpool today, wheat prices in the local market closed at bottom levels.

Wheat closed 2 3/4 to 4 1/2 lower, corn 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 lower, and rye 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 lower. The Liverpool decline of 1/4 to 3/4 cent was explained as due to the sharp advance in foreign demand for wheat.

Report says were placed at 500,000 to 1,000,000 bushels in the United Kingdom and the continent bought the wheat and Denmark bought the corn.
