

### Bandits Nabbed After Auto Chase

Two Youths Confess Gas Station Holdups; Held Under \$5,000 Bonds.

Justice lived up to expectations to-day in police court—swift, sure and certain.

Less than 12 hours after they were caught, Nels Nelson, Sioux Falls, S. D., and Wendall Hallin, Fort Dodge, Ia., had confessed to robbery of two oil filling stations within the week and were bound over to district court under \$5,000 bonds each.

Capture of the crooks by Motorcycle Officers Jack Slavin and Francis Musgrave, incidentally gave three young Omahans, members of the upper social strata of the city, a thrill they will not soon forget, according to Carl Reisch, 18, 5009 California street.

**Officers Commandeer Car.**  
Hoagland, brother of Emma Hoagland, new queen of Ak-Sar-Ben, was driving our car, and as Musgrave and Slavin dived for the running board we started in pursuit of the other car.

"We didn't know the men were highwaymen. The officers wanted them for drunkenness and reckless driving.

"The men in the other car refused to halt at Slavin's command. Slavin hooked one leg over the door of our car and, leaning way out, let the fugitives have a shot from his riot gun. That was the only shot fired. It was the only one necessary. The fugitives slowed down, and as they swung into the north entrance of Elmwood park, Slavin and Musgrave jumped on the running board of their car."

**Confess Two Holdups.**  
"It was a great thrill for us. More so, when we learned on the way to the police station that the men were bandits and not just ordinary 'drunks.'"

Nelson and Hallin confessed to Chief of Detectives Danbaum that they had arrived in Omaha last Tuesday, and the same night held up and robbed the keeper of the filling station at Sixteenth and Leavenworth streets. They also confessed that they had robbed the station at Thirty-third and Lake streets. Both robberies netted them less than \$50, they said.

**Rites Held at David City for Butler County Pioneer**  
David City, Oct. 10.—Funeral services were held this week for Philo Garfield, who died in his 74th year. He was born in Pennsylvania and with his parents came to Butler county in 1858. Philo's father, Solomon Garfield, ran the Nick Shinn ferry across the Platte river.

In 1910, Philo Garfield with his family moved to San Juan, Tex. Philo Garfield helped build the first schoolhouse in Bone Creek township and helped haul lumber for the first building in David City. A brother was the first sheriff of Butler county.

Philo Garfield is survived by his wife, one son, one daughter and two brothers.

**Court at Pawnee City Faced by Heavy Docket**  
Table Rock, Oct. 10.—District court is in session at Pawnee City, Judge J. B. Harper of the First judicial district presiding. The docket this term is the largest in the history of Pawnee county. There are 49 civil cases and nine criminal actions listed for consideration. Twenty-seven of the civil actions are foreclosures or suits on notes. Most of the foreclosure cases probably will be settled or withdrawn before the term is finished.

### Flinn Guilty on 10-Minute Vote

Confession to Bus Office Robbery Is Reputed by Suspect.

Tom Flinn was found guilty of robbing the Union Bus line office, 114 South Seventeenth street, in district court Friday morning. The jury deliberated only 10 minutes.

Flinn is the young man whose case attracted much sympathetic attention when he was tried and acquitted of the murder of John Salerno in federal court in January, 1923. He killed

Salerno while being held a prisoner, he said.

Flinn, on the witness stand, repudiated the confession obtained by police and signed by him just after his arrest.

"They beat me and made me sign it," declared the young man.

But Prosecutor Stalmaster had taken the precaution at the time of the preliminary hearing in police court a few hours after the confession was signed to have Flinn remove part of his clothing before Police Judge Patrick, at which time no signs of violence were found.

Raymond Baker testified that he and Flinn planned and carried out the robbery.
