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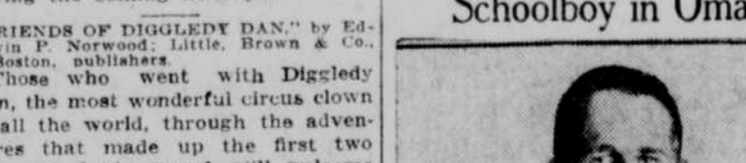
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Tallest 15-Year-Old Schoolboy in Omaha
