Washington, Oct. 20 .- Three men were killed in an explosion in the forward twin mount of the new scout cruiser Trenton during target practice on the southern drill grounds off. Cape Henry, Va., today, the Navy department was informed tonight. A brief message received at the department said: "Powder fire in forward twin mount and three dead."

No names were immediately available of the casualties. The cruiser was said to have been but a few miles from Norfolk when the accident occurred. It is in command of Capt. E. C. Kalofus and has been in commission about six months,
