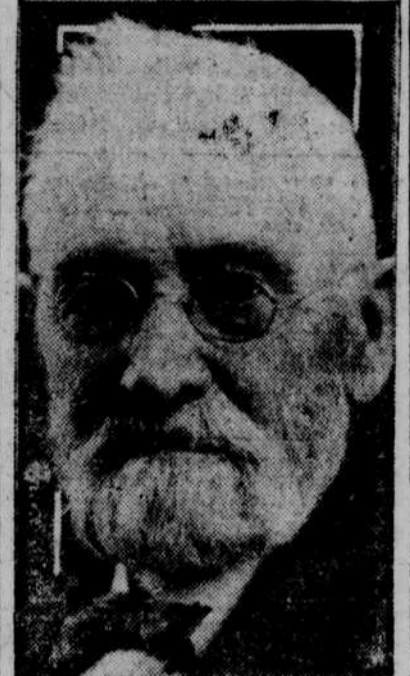


Flames Sweeping Through Kitchen Cremate Recluse

PEKIN CUT OFF; MESSAGES CEASE

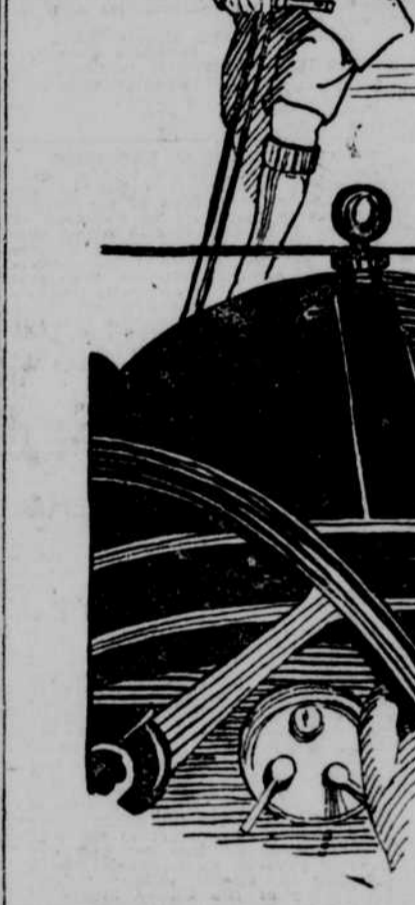
Shanghai, Oct. 23.—Telegraphic communication with Peking was cut off suddenly today.
