
Creighton Preps Upset Dope by Defeating Central High by Score of 13 to 0 South High and Abraham Lincoln Battle to Scoreless Tie Game

field during the first half. Creighton won its first game against Central in the history of Omaha high school sport annals. The Bluejays won the game due to the efforts of the lightest, but one of the games backfields that ever churned up the turf on any Omaha high school grid field. Brilliant backfields may come and go but in Hart, McGuire, Higgins and B. Miller, the Bluejays have nothing to be sneered at.
