

Democrats Stand Between Ranks, Dawes Asserts

Republican Vice Presidential Candidate Carries Campaign Into New York.

New York, Oct. 25.—Charles G. Dawes, speaking tonight in New York for the first time since the beginning of the campaign, scored the La Follette independent movement, assailed the democrats and denounced "cowardly, trimming politicians" in his own party.

The La Follette candidacy bore the brunt of the assault, Mr. Dawes describing it as "an attack leveled at the constitution which, if successful, means destruction of our form of government."

He also attacked its leaders, asserting "we are hearing much about the rule of the people from the men who are speaking really of the rule of the mob."

The attention given by the republican nominee to the democratic opposition was only in passing and considered in a reference to what he termed that party's "attempt to stand between the battle lines with one radical and one conservative candidate."

Respects Courage.

"I respect those men who are fighting this form of government," he said with reference to the La Follette group. "They have courage and I respect their courage. But we have not had anybody on my side for the last four years—at least not many—that have been standing up and fighting."

Mr. Dawes spoke at a republican rally held under the auspices of the republican state committee at Clermont park, Brooklyn. He came into New York late today from Montclair after the meeting to remain until tomorrow night when he will board his special train for a day of campaigning Monday in upstate New York, with speeches at Albany, Syracuse, Utica and Rochester.

Lack of political courage, Mr. Dawes asserted, had resulted in the polling of a small vote in past elections.

"That is the reason why in Wisconsin for four years you have only had about 32 to 40 per cent of the registered vote cast, and through large sections of our country the same thing obtains," he added. "Why? What inducement is there for American citizens to come out and vote when on one side is a man in earnest, courageous, fighting for something that a citizen does not believe in, and on the other side is a cowardly, trimming politician, preaching that by legislation you can get high beef on the hoof and low beef on the table, high railroad wages and low railroad rates, and all that sort of inconsequential stuff and chattering trying to please everybody, putting vote-getting above principle—a pretty poor choice."

Fight Rigging Poor.

"That is one reason why the people have not been to the polls as they should have been. But now you have a fight."

The issue in "this fight" Mr. Dawes told his audience was raised when the La Follette group adopted a platform declaration of submission of "a constitutional amendment providing that congress may by re-enacting a statute make it effective over a judicial veto."

"In other words, at one blow," he said, "it is proposed to destroy the balance of power which exists in this government between the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government and make the executive and judicial subordinate to congress."

"Now what does that mean? We hear a lot of talk in these days of political trimming and cowardice in the effort to please all sides on all questions, about the rights of this bloc and that bloc, the rights of this class and that class and this section and that section. This concerns your rights and my rights. The rights

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Helen Matters to Be Arrested

Warrant Issued Charging Tax Payments With Insufficient Fund Checks.

A warrant for the arrest of Miss Helen Matters was issued by County Attorney Henry Beal Saturday morning.

She is charged with issuing checks with insufficient funds in the bank. The checks were for \$180 and \$1,900, issued August 3 on the Omaha National bank and were given to City and County Treasurer Otto Bauman for payment of taxes.

Bauman said he tried to have the tax receipts returned but was unsuccessful.

Miss Matters is a daughter of Thomas H. Matters and has been his staunch supporter in his several prosecutions in federal and district court.

Her father went to the county attorney's office when he heard of the warrant. He was indignant. He declined, however, to tell where his daughter could be found.

The warrant was signed by Fred Armbrust, deputy county treasurer, who alleged she paid taxes on August 30 with two checks for \$190 and \$1,900 which were returned marked insufficient funds.

Miss Matters was notified at once, he stated, and the 30-day limit required by law allowed to elapse before the warrant was issued.

"I'll put up every dollar I have to keep Helen out of jail," Thomas Matters told Henry Beal, county attorney, while Detective Frank Killian waited for Miss Matters in the Matters office.

Miss Matters when questioned at her

home by telephone by a reporter for The Omaha Bee declined to discuss the situation.

Her bond was set at \$500. Mrs. Matters, her mother, is in New

York City, where she has been visiting for a week.

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
