Lincoln.—Several more outbreaks of hog cholera were reported to County Agent J. F. Aurbaugh during the week. "It is to be regretted that farmers waited until the disease had made such headway before vaccinating their herds," the county agent said. "This causes considerable loss to them that might be eliminated by close observance of the animals and prompt vaccination." At this time of the year the hogs should be watened especially close, the agent said. He estimated last year the Lancaster county farmers lost \$100,000 through hog deaths from cholera.

Omsha—Nearly 100 persons went on he annual Douglas county farm tour ast week, according to the county agent, who, with the farm bureau, arranged for he trip. It included visits to several farms on which various agricultural pursuits were reviewed.

The Douglas County Cow Testing association reports 390 cows tested during the last month of its work. Of these, eight cows were sent to the stockwards for sale, because of their poor records as milk producers: 12 were sold for breeding purposes and three were eliminated for miscellaneous troubles. The highest producing cow had a record of \$4.7 pounds of butter fat. Thirty-three produced more than 40 pounds.

Blair—It pays to keep records of poultry flocks because "it enables the flock owner to learn what phase of his pountry program is making the money and where satisfactory returns are not being received, thereby permitting development of the specific phase and consequent increase of return," the country agent said, in advocating a large enrollment among farmers and poultymen of this county in the state extension service spent last week in this county going over the winter club work with boys and girls of the schools. Through a referendum officially conducted by the Omaha Bar Association, among all the lawyers of the Fourth Judicial District, comprising Washington, Burt, and Douglas Counties, nine candidates for the office of district judge of the Fourth Judicial District have been endorsed for election. The candidates so endorsed are the present District Judges, namely: William A. Redick, Charles A. Goss, William G. Hastings, A. C. Troup, Charles Leslie, Carroll O. Stauffer, James M. Fitzgerald, Arthur C. Wakeley and L. B. Day.

The purpose of endorsing judicial candidates by the members of the Bar is to let the voting public know which candidates are regarded by the lawyers as best qualified and fitted to serve as judges. The plan of endorsing judicial candidates by members of the bar has been carried out successfully and satisfactorily in a number of cities, notably New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Los Angeles.

The referendum was conducted by a committee of five. consisting of the President and Secretary of the Douglas County Bar Association, and three members appointed by the president of the association. A printed ballot carrying the names of all candidates for District Judge was sent to every lawyer in the District. Each ballot cast was sealed in a plain envelope and returned to the Committee by the lawyer casting the ballot. In order to be counted each ballot cast was required to carry a vote for nine judges. The plain sealed envelope containing the ballots, when received by the Committee, were placed in a sealed ballot box and on October 13, 1924, were publicly opened and counted. The balloting was conducted in the above manner in order that the total vote cast might constitute a fair. impartial and accurate expression of the lawyers of the District in their choice of judicial candidates.
