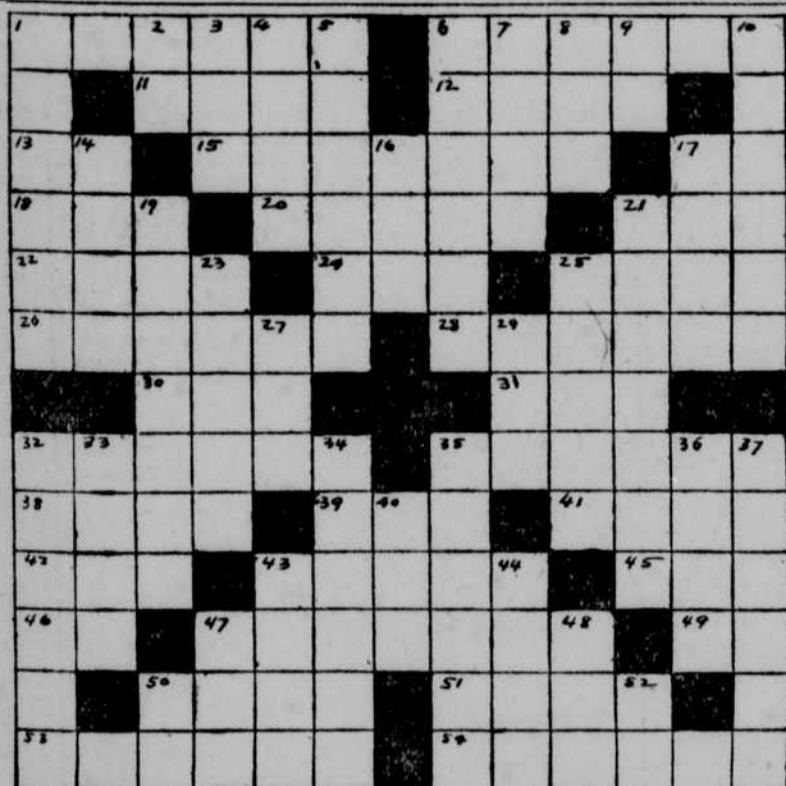


The Daily Cross Word Puzzle

The same number in some cases begins both a vertical and a horizontal word. The definitions of the words to fill the diagram are given in the lists labeled "Horizontal" and "Vertical," with numbers showing where to start the words in the diagram. To see how many letters each word has, count the white spaces until you come to a black square. If you have put in the correct words, they should all serve, horizontally and vertically, with the definitions, and you have solved the puzzle correctly.
