It looks like a soft one for Moran, one of the leaders of the light-weight challenge. Jack Malone, who lost to Mickey Walker a week ago, will meet Morris Schaffer in St. Paul, the home village of Malone, and Frankie Genaro, American fly-weight champion, will take on Al Dundee, a newcomer in the division, in Mansfield, O. Genaro must fight lesser lights of the flyweight class now that Rancho Villa, world's title holder, is on the Pacific bound for the Philippine Islands to visit his countrymen.

MOORE, O'HARA FIGHT DRAW Chicago, Nov. 7.—Ted Moore, English middleweight champion, boxed Joey O'Hara of Fort Dodge, Ia., to a 10-round draw at East Chicago, tonight. The fight was 155 pounds. In the semi-windup Patsy Rocco won a newspaper decision over Jimmy Gory in eight rounds at 150 pounds.

Knine's shoes won two games from the Murphy-Ed. Hs. H. Bloemer was high with 415.

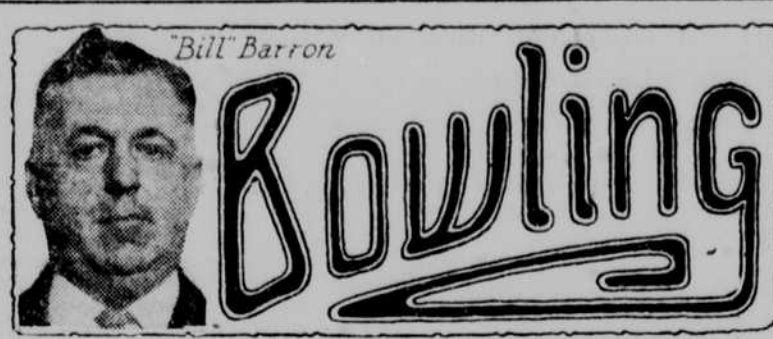
Bill Barron will not be able to compete in the Mid-west bowling tournament at the Elks' alleys Saturday and Sunday.

More strenuous forms of recreation. Bowling is not only a splendid physical exercise, but is also among the best mental recreational activities. If one desires to rest the mind for a time from the problems of the daily tasks, great satisfaction is to be found in bowling.

Some have thought that bowling exercises develops the muscles on one side of the body at the expense of, or at least without benefit to, the muscles on the other side. This is no more true than in such games as baseball, handball and tennis.

Bowling is a splendid physical recreation. It develops the chest, makes firm the lung expansion, reduces a superfluous flesh, practices the eye, clears the complexion, and muscles, especially of the forearm; increases and gives a free grace of movement.

A good bowler has fine posture, and a swift adjustment and splendid control of the body.

Athletes, especially baseball players, keep themselves in good physical condition during the cold weather months by bowling.

Bowling is a mild exercise which tones up practically every muscle in the body, without, as already indicated, overtaxing any. It increases the circulation of the blood, acting as a tonic without any deteriorating after effects.

Alleys in private homes furnish enjoyment for the entire family, young or old, as they can all take part in the game. The Y. M. C. A.s have long since adopted bowling as a valuable asset to their all-around manhood program.
