

"Bob" Scatters Demo Forces in Platte County

Leads Davis in Democratic Stronghold; Norris Polls Large Vote.

Columbus, Neb., Nov. 8.—Platte county, usually democratic stronghold, went into the La Follette-for-president column by a margin of 403 votes; gave United States Senator Norris, republican, a majority of 801, but turned about and gave Congressman Howard a lead of 3,743 and smaller majorities to Norton and other democrats on the state and legislative tickets.

The official canvass, completed today, shows Platte county gave La Follette 2,576 votes over John Davis, who polled 2,173, and who, in turn, led Calvin Coolidge by 65, the latter's total being 2,108.

While giving Senator Norris a majority of 801, Platte county voters rejected the constitutional amendment which he endorsed.

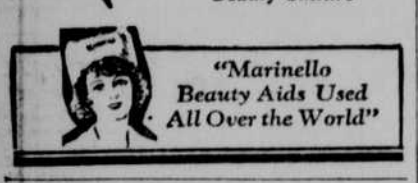

Teach Games, Woman's Plea

Play With Children, Teachers' Sectional Meeting Is Advised.

Teach your children to play games and educate them with toys, declared Mrs. Mignon Quaw, Bosman, Mont., who addressed the Americanization and Parent-Teacher section meeting at the Technical High school Friday afternoon.

Games teach the child courage and self-reliance; the right toys will teach them many things, she said. She warned parents to prevent their children from what she termed "nervous toys." These she said were small playthings which strained the child's sight and stressed his nerves.

"Play with your children," she admonished. "Then they will not tell the stranger, 'Gee my daddy's awfully old; he's almost 30.'"

Dr. J. M. Patton, Omaha, spoke on "The Hygiene of the Eye" before the Child Welfare and Health Education section. He urged precautions in preventing needless accidents to the sight, illustrating how the school child's efficiency and sight were destroyed by poor lighting at home or at school.

Careful analysis was the only aid Leon Smith, assistant superintendent of Omaha schools, could suggest in his discussion of "What to Do With the Atypical Child," which he delivered before the Child Welfare and Health Education section.

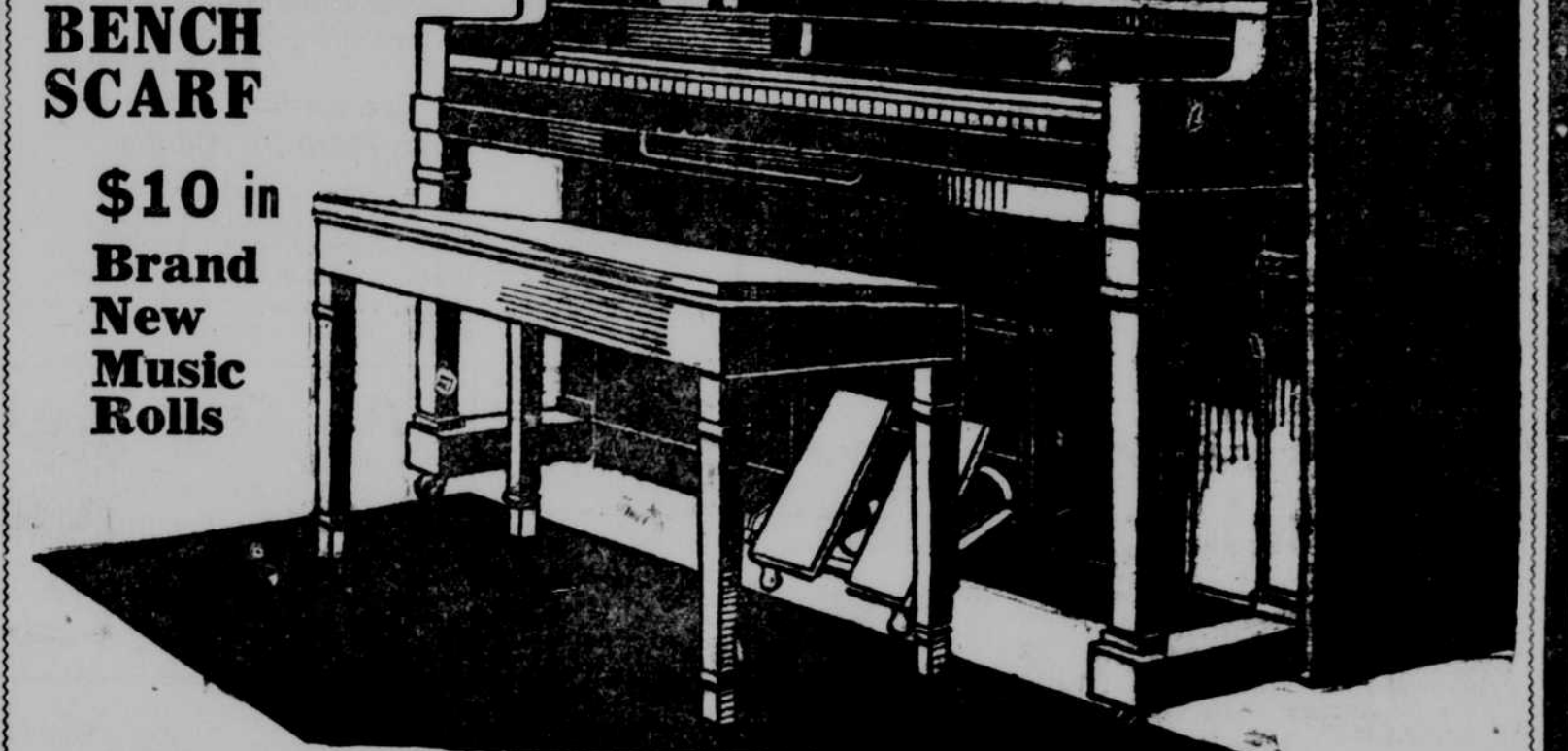
