Washington, Nov. 10 .- Congres will await the recommendations of President Coolidge's new agricultural ommission before acting on proposed legislation in the interest of the farmng industry, Senator Arthur Capper Kansas, leader of the senate "farm bloc," announced today in a statement

Despite the desire of the administra tion to enact constructive and remedial farm legislation without delay little toward this end can be accomplished in the forthcoming short session of congress.
